

# 58,500 SIGNED, RECHECK SHOWS

Seattle's registration under the Selective Service Act of men between the ages of 45 and 64 years was completed last night and when a recheck of figures was made today it was found that only about 58,500 men had registered, or about 1,500 less than had been expected.

Sunday night it was estimated that 60,000 had been enrolled but this figure was in error, Selective Service officials said.

Registration Saturday was about 23,500 and the Sunday total was about 27,000. Only about 8,000 men registered yesterday. An accurate check of the total still is to be made.

Seattle's registration was accomplished at the Field Artillery Armory in efficient fashion by a crew of volunteer clerks.

## Adm. Brown, O'Hare Leader, Is Honored

WASHINGTON, April 28.—(AP)—Vice Adm. Wilson Brown, who commanded a task force in the Pacific on a mission for eight weeks in February and March, was awarded the Distinguished Service Medal today by President Roosevelt, who presented the decoration.

Secretary of the Navy Knox said Adm. Brown was the commanding officer of the task force to which Lieut. Comdr. Edward H. O'Hare was assigned when he shot down five Japanese bombers and damaged a sixth in operations off the Gilbert Islands last February 20.

Brown received the Distinguished Service Medal in Mr. Roosevelt's office and then had lunch with the Chief Executive.

## City's Jap Evacuees Start 'Housekeeping' in Puyallup

Vanguard of the 2,000 Japanese who will be evacuated from two areas in Seattle by Friday arrived at their temporary home in Puyallup this afternoon and immediately began settling themselves in the community dwellings which have been built on the Puyallup Fair Grounds.

The first contingent of 500 men, women and children made the trip from Seattle in private automobiles and in busses chartered by the Army.

With the same efficiency which marked their departure from Seattle, the group took living quarters assigned to them and then began the hurried task of preparing the assembly center for the 1,500 more Japanese who will arrive within the next two days.

**Group Faces New Life**

The party was in high spirits for the most part as it left Seattle and the same attitude prevailed as the members stepped on the grounds which will be their home until they are transferred to resettlement centers east of the mountains.

The Japanese knew they were facing a new life and had seen their Seattle homes for the last time in a long while, but they accepted the situation cheerfully. They have no intimation as to where they next will be moved, other than the presumption they will be sent to the nearest resettlement center, the one being prepared on government land in Idaho.

Dinner was ready for the Japanese when they arrived. After the meal, men busied themselves erecting the wood stoves which will heat the barracks. Women placed mattresses on the beds and arranged baggage. Children romped on the barracks' grounds.

**Furniture Built-In**

Each family was assigned an apartment 17 by 20 feet. Furniture, all built-in except camp stools, consists of beds, cabinets, tables and shelving.

Some of the larger families required two apartments.

Each block of apartments has bathing facilities and a mess hall. There is a separate building housing a laundry.

Robert E. Turner of the War-time Civil Control Administration said the slogan for the camp would be, "Keep 'em busy." Japanese doctors, dentists and tradesmen will be given jobs as soon as possible in their respective fields of work, he said.

While Seattle Japanese were in the process of moving, the Associated Press reported from San Francisco that the Army had ordered all Japanese removed from the city of Portland, Or., by next Tuesday noon. This is the first evacuation

in Oregon. The Japanese in Portland will register tomorrow and Thursday. They will go to the assembly center recently completed on the Pacific International Livestock Exposition grounds. Portland has about 1,900 Japanese residents.

**Necessities Taken**

At 8 o'clock this morning the Seattle evacuees began to arrive at three pick-up points previously designated, taking with them those necessities which the Army had advised them to carry. These included blankets, linen, silverware and dishes, extra clothing and personal necessities such as tooth brushes and razors.

Japanese who reported at Elliott Avenue and Virginia Street were the first to move to the meeting point in Beacon Avenue for the start to Puyallup.

Many friends, who will be evacuated later in the week, were on hand to bid the first contingent good-bye. Members of the crowd were in gay spirits. There was laughing and shouting and cheerful farewells. Children were in picnic mood and the departure was like the start of an excursion party.

At Lane Street and Eighth Avenue South, five busses were provided for 200 Japanese without other transportation. Here, also, everything was cheerfulness. Another group left from the third center in Spokane Street near 21st Avenue South, but it was a small one.

At Beacon Avenue and Alaska Street, where the caravan started toward Puyallup, the Japanese took their last look at Seattle "for the duration." There were no tears in evidence, only a few sad faces among the waving and smiling occupants of the many automobiles and busses.

**Girls Bid Youths Good-Bye**

Two white girls, in an automobile bearing a California license, were at the starting point to bid farewell to two Japanese youths. The youths sat in the girls' car until starting time came. Then they kissed the girls good-bye and joined the caravan.

Haruo Fujino, former president of the Oriental Restaurant Workers' Association, Local 844, was among those who went to Puyallup today. He was accompanied by his family. Fujino said Local 844 had been dissolved because of the evacuation but would be reorganized when the war is over. He will become head waiter of the mess halls at the assembly center.

Yates were supplied for moving the evacuees' personal belongings. They are allowed to take their automobiles to Puyallup but must have made arrangements for their disposal after reaching there.

The Japanese themselves, under Army direction, are arranging all evacuation details. The removal was organized by the Japanese-American Citizens' League, headed by James Y. Sakamoto, editor of an English-language Japanese newspaper and the man who will be director of the assembly center for the Japanese. The evacuees will have self-government, which already has been organized.

Today's removal procedure went like clockwork, indicating that the later and larger evacuation will be accomplished with precision equal to that of a month ago when the Army removed 239 Japanese from Bainbridge Island. The Bainbridge Island evacuees were taken to the Manzanar relocation center in Owens Valley, Calif.

The Puyallup assembly center, consisting of temporary barracks with central mess halls and built in 17 days, will accommodate 8,000. The 200 Japanese to be evacuated from Alaska also will go to Puyallup.

Evacuation orders so far have not affected Japanese farmers in the Puget Sound area, except those on Bainbridge Island, but it was indicated these farmers soon would be removed by the urgent appeal today by the Washington State War Board of the United States Department of Agriculture for farmers to take over Japanese land.

## DON'T TOUCH IT; IT MAY EXPLODE!

A warning to civilians along the coasts of Washington and Oregon not to pick up or tamper with any strange metal objects washed up on the beaches was issued today by the 13th Naval District. The same suspicion should be directed to such objects on the shores of Puget Sound and off the Columbia River, the warning said.

Such objects, the Navy said, should not be tampered with until it is established by competent experts that they are not mines, bombs or other device capable of exploding.

No reports have been received as to the presence of floating enemy mines, either laid from submarines or dropped from planes, but "watchfulness is the best advice," the Navy said.

Finders of mines should report them immediately to the 13th Naval District headquarters by way of the nearest Naval activity, and under no circumstances should a bomb or mine be handled or moved except by trained Army or Navy personnel.

## Council Group O.K.'s Watchman at Dump

The City Council public-safety committee today recommended for passage an ordinance hiring a laborer at \$120 a month to keep fires under control at night at the municipal garbage dumps.

The Army and Civilian War Commission asked for a better night check on the fires so they will not be beacons in case of a blackout.

## F. B. I. Begins Raids On California Japanese

SAN FRANCISCO, April 28.—(AP)—In its first big series of raids in Northern California this month, Federal Bureau of Investigation agents today moved concertedly against potentially dangerous Japanese aliens in 24 cities and towns in 15 counties.

More than 100 officers, including police and sheriff's deputies from 21 different law-enforcement agencies joined in the raids.

Nat J. L. Pieper, special agent in charge of the San Francisco F. B. I. office, said the raids were directed primarily against known members of Japanese nationalistic organizations.

## Defamer Must Pay Fine in Shillings

LANCASTER, Pa., April 28.—David Shelley, Terre Hill, Pa., was under court order today to pay damages of 40 shillings for defaming the character of a fellow townsman, Isaac W. Mohler. Mohler charged Shelley accused him of having "long fingers and stealing."

Shelley was found guilty under a Pennsylvania slander law enacted in 1713, which provides "normal damages in English money." The damages were ordered paid in English money.

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## Canada, U. S. Give Selectees Choice of Flag

Canadian citizens in the United States, who have not taken out first naturalization papers, will be allowed to apply for service in Canadian armed forces when called for induction in the United States, and the reverse privilege will be offered to American citizens in Canada, according to an agreement between the two governments, it was announced today.

According to information received from Maj. Gen. H. F. G. Letson, The Adjutant General of the Canadian Army, the agreement provides that such a man in either country will be given his choice of fighting under the Canadian or American flag.

Until this agreement, Canadian citizens in the United States were liable for induction into United States armed forces under the Selective Service Act and American citizens in Canada were liable for Canadian duty under that country's compulsory military-service system.

## Army Plane Crash Kills Rabbi's Wife

BALBOA, C. Z., April 28.—Mrs. Esther Wilkin, wife of Rabbi Nathan Wilkin, Jr., was killed today when an Army pursuit plane crashed into the Jewish Welfare Center Building in Balboa.

Army intelligence headquarters announced that the crash was caused by motor failure and that the pilot of the plane—a P-40 type—bailed out and was uninjured.

# DR. LEWIS GIVEN DEFENSE POST

Appointment of Dr. Arthur E. Lewis, Seattle physician, as assistant state medical officer for civilian defense, was announced today by Dr. Donald G. Evans, director of the state Department of Health. Dr. Evans is the chief state medical officer for civilian defense.

Dr. Lewis returned yesterday from Cincinnati, where he took a course in the medical aspects of chemical warfare. He soon will tour the state to speak before emergency medical units, defense coordinators' meeting and in hospitals.

Dr. Evans, working with the Washington State Defense Council, is creating medical areas throughout the state, in which smaller communities will draw on big cities for doctors, nurses, ambulances and medical supplies in case of attack.
