### Nails, Lumber Shortage Halts Box Production

Grain-storage construction and apple-box making are at a standstill in Washington State because of nail and lumber shortages, Henry P. Carstensen, master of the Washington State Grange, said today.

Nails allocated to this area were taken over by the Army, Carstensen said he had been advised by the Washington congressional delegation. A supply was promised more than a month ago. Due to the shortage of trucks and sacks, a more than usual amount of grain and peas will have to be stored in bins this year, and unusually large crops are expected.

Apple growers are affected, also, Carstensen said. The growers hope to have "school-boy" labor, as hardly enough labor for thinning, picking and sorting apples is expected to be available.

### Boys Finishing School Sought For Hawaii Jobs

Faced with a growing shortage of manpower, the Seattle office of the United States Civil Service Commission today appealed to boys graduating from high school to accept employment as classified laborers and helpers at Pearl Harbor.

Pointing out that older men with dependents hesitate to leave their homes and accept employment where they will be unable to be with their families, Paul N. Cole, acting manager of the Seattle office, declared that senior high school boys offer a logical source of applicants.

The minimum age limit is 18. The pay rate is 62 cents an hour for 40 hours a week and time and one-half for all hours over 40. Cole said the work is not heavy. Applicants must be on file by Monday, May 25, at Room 407, Seattle Postoffice Building, or at any first or second-class postoffice in Washington, Oregon, Idaho or Montana.

Cole declared that in the past it has been the practice of draft boards to defer men who have accepted employment at Pearl Harbor.

Seattle Public Schools are cooperating with the agency in recruiting workers. It was pointed out that men who enlist now will not be sent there until after school is out.

### 2 Torpedos Put Merchant Sailor in Navy

If you've had two ships torpedoed and sunk beneath you, you get "mad." That's why Albert Foy Johnston, 24-year-old merchant marine fireman, stepped ashore here yesterday long enough to enlist in the Navy. He left immediately for the San Diego Naval Training Station to join a ship that could "shoot back at those Japs."

Johnston had been a year and a half with the merchant marine, and within the space of a month was on two tankers that were sunk by Uncle Sam's foes. He was aboard the Medio shortly before Christmas, sailing southward from Seattle, when the Medio was torpedoed by a submarine. Five men were lost and Johnston spent eight hours adrift off the coast of Oregon. A fireman who had relieved Johnston for a 45-minute rest was killed in this torpedoing.

His second brush with the enemy occurred January 15 when the Ann Miller, which he had joined, was torpedoed, and sank off the north coast of Australia. A United States destroyer picked up a lifeboat in which Johnston was adrift, but 22 of the Ann Miller's crew were lost.

Johnston liked the throb of power and the guns aboard the rescue ship, and decided to join the Navy. He has earned a rating as fireman, second class, but he hopes to learn enough about gunnery to send at least a message or two back to the Japs should his ship encounter them.

He comes from Amarillo, Tex., and was a cowhand before taking to the sea.

### Stores, Banks Will Close On Memorial Day

Memorial Day—Saturday, May 30—will be observed in Seattle with the closing of stores, banks, other financial institutions and most county, city, state and federal offices.

The Retail Trade Bureau of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce announced today that Memorial Day is a regularly observed closing day for retail establishments.

Memorial Day, traditionally the first big day of the summer season for outings to beaches, lakes and mountains, will find many stay-at-homes this year, but others will take advantage of the last long week-end for pleasure tours before gasoline-rationing takes effect June 1.

Memorial Day observances are being planned by many organizations this year, with the ceremonies to take on new reverence and meaning because of the new war engulfing the world. This year, for the first time since the First World War, there are new soldier and sailor dead of the United States to whom homage will be paid on Memorial Day.

Among ceremonies here will be the 16th city-wide Memorial Day program at the Veterans Memorial Cemetery, where graveside services will be sponsored jointly by the American Legion, Spanish-American War Veterans, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Disabled American Veterans of the World War, Grand Army of the Republic, Canadian Legion, Military Order of the Purple Heart, Military Order of the World War, Navy Mothers' Club, Navy Wives' Club and Gold Star Mothers.

### Cuffless Trousers To Stay, Says Clothier

Minor changes in men's clothing ordered by the War Relocation Authority have not harmed the general appearance of suits and sport clothes being shown for summer wear, Clarence Klopstein, president of Klopfenstein's, Inc., men's clothing store, said yesterday on his return from an extended buying trip to Eastern cities.

"So skillful has been the styling on the new garments," Klopfenstein said, "that many manufacturers today believe that cuffless trousers are here to stay. Buyers generally are approving the new models, indicating that the war-necessitated cut of garments may become permanent."

Price ceilings now in effect, while causing some hardship in the clothing trade, are meeting with widespread approval for their protective features, the clothier added.

### Operators of Jap Farm Get U. S. Aid

To assure continued production on 477 acres of Japanese farmland in the Bellevue area, a federal loan of \$32,107 has been made to the Western Farm and Produce, Inc., which will take over and operate the tracts. The loan, made by the Wartime Civil Control Administration of the Department of Agriculture, for the most part will go to 33 Japanese farmers leaving their land in payment for machinery and crop interests.

### United Discontinues Service to Spokane

SPOKANE, May 20.—(AP)—Jack Misselhorn, district traffic manager, said yesterday United Air Lines would discontinue service to Spokane within the next 30 days.

Misselhorn said the discontinuance, which will suspend plane service between Spokane, Walla Walla and Pendleton, Or., was due entirely to the Army's taking over of commercial airplane planes. Service will be restored, he added, as soon as planes and personnel are again available.

### British Navy Men To Address Wardens

Hirabayashi surrendered to agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation after the deadline for removal of all Japanese from Seattle. The Japanese, a senior in arts and science, was to be arraigned today before United States Commissioner Harry M. Westfall.

### Langlie to Welcome Lodge at Olympia

Delegates and officers attending the 41st session of the Grand Lodge of the Ancient Order of United Workmen of Washington will be welcomed to Olympia tomorrow by Gov. Arthur B. Langlie and State Insurance Commissioner William Sullivan. There will be 25 delegates and officers, including Grand Master J. Frank Fogarty, representing Seattle.

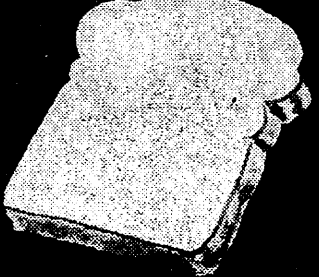
