

# SOLONS PROBING WAR ON 'SUBS'

 WASHINGTON, June 4.—A Senate naval affairs subcommittee is making a preliminary investigation of the Navy's anti-submarine warfare and may call naval officers for a public hearing, Chairman Ellender, Democrat, Louisiana, said today.

Ellender said the group, which includes Senators Andrews, Democrat, Florida, and Wiley, Republican, Wisconsin, as members, was attempting to determine if all possible measures had been taken to thwart the submarines' attacks on merchant shipping in the Atlantic and the Gulf of Mexico.

The group was particularly interested, he said, in learning if controversy over designs had delayed the construction of small P-T boats and other subs.

In this connection, he said he had interviewed at length one shipbuilder who has constructed boats of this type, as well as several naval officers.

"If we aren't entirely satisfied that everything possible is being done to halt these sinkings, we are going into the whole matter in a public hearing," he declared.

## New Shop Building For City Proposed

Construction of a new shop building to store city equipment was suggested yesterday afternoon by Charles C. Hughes, building superintendent, and City Councilman David Levine. The building would replace the dilapidated shop on Lake Union, where municipal equipment has been stored.

The officials suggested the Council appropriate \$3,500 for the building and that bids be called immediately on the work.

"Let me die," Schuler cried, and collapsed. His attorney, Morris Lavine, pleaded for leniency, contending Schuler was "mentally eccentric." Dr. Roos Moore, court-appointed psychiatrist, said the youth was sane.

Schuler formerly was employed by a wireless service.

# LOOK OUT FOR JAPS IN UNIFORM

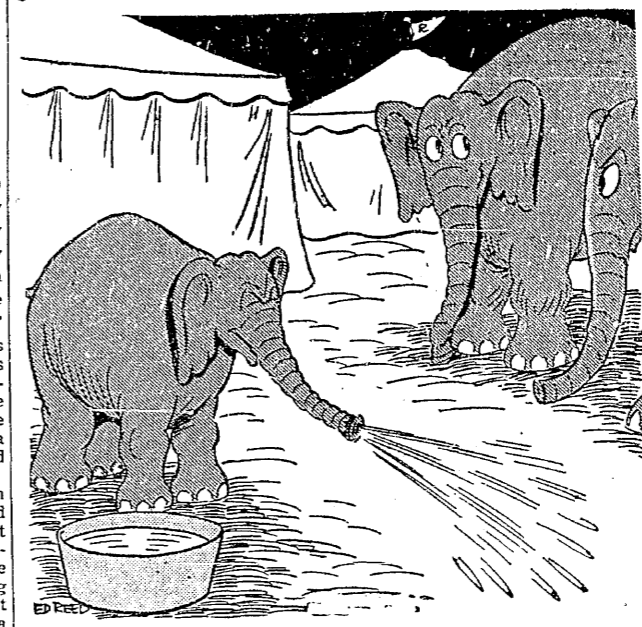
SAN FRANCISCO, June 4.—(AP)—The general public was asked by the Army today to report any Japanese in an American Army uniform and to assume that such a soldier in the Western Defense area might be a "fifth-columnist."

"All Japanese who are members of the Army of the United States have been removed from the Western Defense Command and the Fourth Army except three on the post at Ford Ord who are on a special assignment," the Army said in a communique.

"Any Japanese in an American Army uniform should be reported immediately to law enforcement agencies. . . . The general public should watch for any possible appearance of Japanese wearing Army uniforms and to assume that any such individual might be a 'fifth columnist'."

# BACKERS HOPING TO RETAIN C. C. C.

WASHINGTON, June 4.—(AP)—Supporters of the depression-born Civilian Conservation Corps, which is threatened with dissolution, battled in the House today to preserve at least the organization's framework until the war is over.

The issue developed rapidly yesterday after the House appropriations committee, by a vote of 15 to 12, asked Congress to dissolve the 9-year-old organization, which has had on its rolls, at one time or another, 3,000,000 persons, and which has spent during that time \$2,800,000,000.

The test will come on the question of restoring a committee-eliminated allotment of \$75,818,000 to provide for 350 camps for labor duty at military cantonments and for forest-fire fighting. That amount was \$171,142,000 lower than the 1942 allotment.
