BELLINGHAM, Monday, April 15.—A public mass meeting under the auspices of labor unions of Bellingham, represented by the Central Labor Council, in conjunction with the Whatcom County Grange, will be held in this city, at the Bellingham Hotel, Wednesday evening, May 8. Among the matters to be considered will be the election of temporary officers to issue call for the organization of direct legislation clubs. These clubs or leagues will elect delegates to a convention to be held in Bellingham about June 6. A committee on organization, order of business, resolutions and finances will be selected and every effort will be made to further the work of keeping the matter of direct legislation before the voters of every county in this state. State Senator Cutler has been suggested as chairman to call the meeting to order, and he will also make an address. President C. B. Case of the State Federation of Labor has also promised to attend and make an address, which will be one of the most prominent speakers present.

DOUST ANNOUNCES HIS PLATFORM Candidate for Republican Mayoralty Nomination in Spokane Promises Equal Rights to All if He Is Elected. Favors Consideration of Laboring Men, Prosecution of Lawbreakers, Clean Streets and Elimination of Vice.

The Times Special Service. SPOKANE, Monday, April 15.—W. J. Doust, candidate for the republican mayoralty nomination, has announced the platform on which he will make the race for the mayoralty nomination and on which he will run for mayor if he is given the nomination. The reading of the platform was the occasion of enthusiasm. Dr. N. Fred Essig, who said he voiced the sentiments of the other members of the committee, said: "This is a platform of which no man may feel ashamed. It shows a man into the home of every voter in the city. It is the document on which Mr. Doust will be elected mayor." It is the intention of the campaign committee to mail copies of the platform to every voter in the city immediately. In addition to the platform, the letter will contain a picture of Doust and the names of the executive committee who are standing behind his candidacy. The platform given out by Doust follows: The Platform. "To the Spokane Republican Campaign Committee—Gentlemen: I desire to thank you very kindly for your kindness in offering your support for the office of mayor of Spokane, and I believe will be pleasing and satisfactory to the people of Spokane. It is as follows: "The best government for all the people. "The best police force in the Northwest. "The best fire department in Washington. "The best lighted city in the Inland Empire. "The best and cleanest streets possible. "The most beautiful parks and park system. "The most good amusements and entertainments. "The strictest economy in purchasing material. "The most careful consideration of our laboring men. "The best scavenger system obtainable. "The elimination of vice and vicious practices. "The driving out of the idle criminal element. "The prompt prosecution of thieves, thugs, pickpockets, shoplifters and lawbreakers. "No graft—no favors. Equal rights to all special privileges to none. "Abundant water for all the people's needs. "William J. Doust, hereby pledge you that if elected mayor of Spokane I will use my best efforts to carry out every plank in this platform. Sincerely yours, W. J. DOUST." Names Finance Committee. Ham to appoint a committee of ten to select a committee of 100 that shall work for a permanent republican organization in Spokane city and county. Members of the committee expressed confidence that Doust will be nominated and will be elected mayor. However, the best of feeling was expressed toward C. Herbert Moore, the opposing candidate, and gratification was expressed that all forces of the Republican party are working for common success at the coming spring election.

MENINGITIS CONTINUES TO RAGE IN PORTLAND

Public Library Is Ordered Closed in Hope of Checking Spread of Disease. PORTLAND, Ore., Monday, April 15.—Spinal meningitis is now feared more than any other disease in this city, although the last few days have been bright and sunny. Physicians are at a loss to understand the widespread activity of the disease in weather which is supposed to quickly kill the germs. The public library was closed yesterday by the health officer and will be thoroughly fumigated. Herman Mathis, a messenger boy who reported the library, died last night of the disease. As the boy had been employed to deliver books to the library from the central building, it is feared that he may have spread the disease. Edith Rowell, 12 years old, is fatally ill of the malady and is expected to die at any time. Dr. Ray P. Robbins of Sunnyside has also been stricken and no hopes are held out for his recovery. Mrs. J. R. Peterson, who lives on the Sunnyside, is afflicted with the disease, but physicians hope for her recovery. It is said chances are good that she will survive. Spinal meningitis seems to have secured a firmer foothold than it ever had here. It baffles physicians who have treated the cases, and it appears to spring up in widely separated districts without any apparent relation to cases elsewhere.

WHIPPLE SUSTAINED BY SUPREME COURT

Verdict of King County Superior Court Upheld and Receivership Will Be Continued. OLYMPIA, Monday, April 15.—The supreme court today affirmed the case of Whipple, respondent, vs. J. H. Lee, appellant, American Investment & Improvement Company, defendant, from King County. Whipple bought a partnership in the firm of Young & Lee, Seattle real estate dealers, and on the refusal of Lee to account for certain funds which were claimed to be partnership funds, a receivership was appointed for and obtained. The company involved was made up of appellant Lee and members of his household, and he appealed from the receiver's order on the ground that the company had not been taken into consideration in the receivership application. The supreme court finds, however, that the company concerned was in reality appellant Lee, being made up of Lee and his relatives, and refuses to grant any relief from the receivership.

JAPANESE DISPLACE WHITES AT CHEHALIS

Labor Strike Follows the Advent of Asiatics Employed by a Lewis County Lumber Company. CENTRALIA, Monday, April 15.—The Chehalis River Lumber Company, of this city, is in trouble owing to the employment of four Japanese workmen. As soon as it was known that the four Japanese had been engaged the whole force of white men employed by the company walked out, with the exception of one man who was to hold the position of boss over the imported Japs. The strike extended to all the men engaged in logging in connection with the company, and the strikers had been with the company as long as three and four years.
