

RUNNER LINKED IN BIGAMY CASE

Mrs. Shirely J. Orr, 38 years old, held in the city jail on a bigamy charge, and Maynard J. Jeffrey, 22, Navy sailor whom she is accused of wedding bigamously, were married by a deputy King County assessor, who is a retired minister, on a "small order" license obtained from Port Townsend, police announced yesterday.

Neither Jeffrey nor William H. Orr, Jr., 25, shipyard worker whom authorities contend is the legal husband, is being held.

The ceremony involving Mrs. Orr and Jeffrey was performed July 11 and was arranged through William E. Whittig, "marriage runner" at the County-City Building, Detectors Lieuts. E. A. Dickinson and George O'Brien said.

Double-Wedding Performed

The couple, along with another couple who were married at the same time in a double ceremony, went to the home of O. F. Kreiger, 3117 Harvard Ave. N., deputy county assessor who is a retired Methodist minister. Kreiger performed the ceremony, the detector said.

Whittig previously forwarded the two couples' license applications to Port Townsend and later turned over the marriage licenses to them after they had been issued from County Auditor Paul Richardson's office there.

Whittig, who long has been the center of controversies with the King County auditor's office for his practices as a marriage runner, said that as far as he was concerned, "the whole thing was perfectly legitimate." Whittig added that he did not "think I made a single penny out of the case."

Mother Here, Father Coming

Meanwhile, the detectives disclosed that Mrs. Orr's mother has arrived here to aid her daughter and that the young wife's father is expected today from Portland, Or.

King County Auditor Robert A. Morris said he has asked the Jefferson County auditor's office for a list of licenses obtained by Whittig. Morris complained that Whittig's practices in sending to the other county for licenses pared King County's revenues.

Still pending in the State Supreme Court is decision on Whittig's appeal of Superior Judge J. T. Ronald's decision enjoining the runner from continuing in business at the Courthouse.

SEAMAN FROM Seattle Held In Germany

Edward Herman Johnson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Herman Johnson, 110 21st Ave. N., is a prisoner of war in Germany, the parents have been notified by the War Department.

This was the first word from or concerning their son the Johnsons have received in three years. The War Department message disclosed that he had been a member of the crew of a merchant vessel when he was captured by the enemy.

Johnson, 26 years old, attended Longfellow School and Garfield High School here. He had been a seaman for several years. He was last home in 1937, when he was in the Marine Hospital at Seattle while after shipping home from China. He went to sea again that year, and from letters received up to three years ago, his family only knew he was in Atlantic and South American waters.

LEVY URGED FOR COUNTY HOSPITAL

A proposal that a 1-mill levy be placed on the ballot for Seattle and King County voters, to raise approximately \$330,000 to extend the county hospital system, will be discussed at a conference within the next few days between county and city officials, County Commissioner Tom Smith announced today.

Smith said that under the proposal, operation of the City Hospital at the Public Safety Building would be discontinued. The commissioner pointed out the levy would eliminate the City Hospital allotment from the city budget, thus recompensing the city for its contribution to support of the county hospital system.

Smith said City Councilmen David Levine and Bob Jones have reacted favorably toward the proposal.

Through the fund raised by the levy, Smith said, it is proposed to allocate \$175,000 to match funds expected as a federal allocation for a 200-bed addition to Harborview County Hospital. The balance would be used for additions and improvements to the county's tuberculosis hospital at Georgetown and for the construction at strategic locations in rural King County of three public clinics which would operate as part of the county-hospital system.

Smith declared the City Hospital is "an unnecessary duplication of the county-hospital system."

**Assailant's Wounds
Fatal to Druggist**

EUGENE, Or., Sept. 17.—(AP)—Head wounds inflicted by a hammer in the hands of a crazed assailant, Wednesday took the life of Walter O. Van Atta, 49 years old, Eugene druggist since 1913.

The assailant, Eugene Burch, 32, shouted after felling Van Atta: "I just killed Hitler." Arrested, he later committed suicide in the Lane County jail.

Chief Invents Raid Siren
