

BOOKIES 'CLOSED ISSUE' --- MAYOR

After a conference with Police Chief Herbert D. Kimsey, Mayor William F. Devin said today the horse racing bookmaking establishments are "a closed issue," for the reason that the "bookies" are closed.

"The state has closed the bookies and so they are a closed issue as far as I am concerned," Mayor Devin said. "I discussed the situation with the chief this forenoon. The chief feels the state authorities are the ones to work against the bookies because they have more power to cut off telephone service.

"The chief has been told by the prosecutor that pari-mutuel bookmaking establishments are legal. Inasmuch as the prosecutor is the official who must file state cases, it seems the chief would find it difficult to make arrests when the prosecutor thinks the bookies are legal and would not prosecute them."

The mayor said the chief could arrest bookies for violation of the city ordinance against betting, but this is not the most effective method of closing the bookies.

Devin said he is informed no bookmaking establishments are operating since the raids directed by the State Patrol and the Department of Public Service.

Women Must Increase Their Salvage Work

Women should take charge

Women throughout America must be prepared to supplement men in direction and administration of war-salvage programs, Mrs. Helen Cummings Cook of Washington, D. C., said in Seattle today.

Mrs. Cook, here to confer with salvage officials, represents a women's salvage program sponsored by the War Production Board. She announced that state heads of women's organizations in Washington—labor unions, clubs, civic groups and fraternal orders—will meet in Seattle Friday to "set up the machinery" whereby "women's divisions" may play increasingly important roles in salvaging critical war materials.

"As more and more men are drawn into the armed forces or into war production, it will be essential to have trained women ready and capable to take over," Mrs. Cook said.

Through the already established women's organizations, women will be trained for essential "duration" tasks in all phases of salvage collection, Mrs. Cook explained.

Mrs. Cook praised the response of America to the plea for scrap metal, and she said the most pressing immediate job is to "get all this scrap picked up as swiftly as possible."

Mrs. Cook predicted that other items, in addition to fats, metals and tin cans, will be placed on critical salvage lists before the war is won, but she could not say what materials might be the next to be sought for salvage.

The women who will form the nucleus of a women's division of salvage agencies in Washington at the meeting in Seattle Friday will convene at the Frederick & Nelson auditorium at 1:30.

CURFEW TRIAL OF JAP IS STARTED

While other prisoners in King County jail grow restless with nothing to do, Gordon Kiyoshi Hirabayashi, 24-year-old Seattle Japanese on trial today on charges of violating the evacuation and curfew orders last May, has kept himself busy reading and answering letters from all over the United States.

Hirabayashi, who has been in jail since May, told a reporter this morning that he has received approximately 500 letters since his case was given publicity, many of them agreeing with his stand that the evacuation orders were in violation of his constitutional rights as a citizen.

Few From Japanese

There have been letters from as far away as Vermont, the Carolinas, Pennsylvania and New York, a great many from residents on the West Coast, 80 per cent of them being from Caucasians, with few from Japanese in camps.

Hirabayashi said that he was acquainted with a lot of his correspondents, but that some were strangers to him. He said that he didn't think that those who disagreed with him would take the trouble to write.

"I am in a room in the jail with about 40 other men," he said. "It gets pretty noisy, so I haven't been able to keep on studying. But I have been trying to answer these letters, and instead of the time hanging heavy on my hands, the days haven't been long enough."

Hirabayashi, who was born in Seattle, was a senior at the University of Washington, majoring in mathematics, but planning to change his major to sociology. He said that some Japanese have written and said that they felt as he did and that if they had thought the situation over they might have joined him in his stand. The Japanese boys said that others in camp, however, felt that cooperation was the best thing, hoping that they would get a "break" later from the government if they would cooperate now.

Father Is First Witness

First witness called to the stand this forenoon was Hirabayashi's father, Shungo Hirabayashi, who with the boy's mother was brought here from the Japanese relocation camp at Tule Lake, Calif. The defendant said it was nice to see his parents again, but that he was sorry that the only place they could stay was in jail and that some of his friends were hoping to have them stay with them.

The case is being tried before United States District Judge Lloyd L. Black. A jury of two women and ten men was chosen without peremptory challenges on either side.

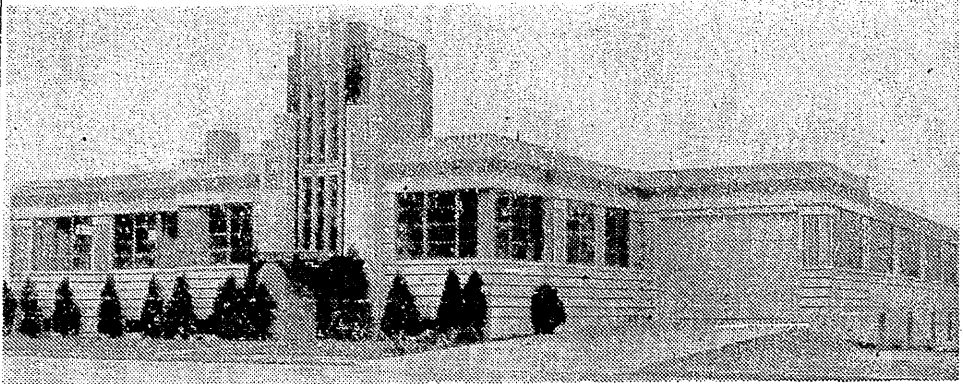
J. Charles Dennis, United States attorney, is representing the government, and Hirabayashi's counsel is Frank Walters.

In his opening statement Dennis said that the evidence would show that Hirabayashi refused to report for evacuation although authorities tried to convince him that he should, and refused to obey the curfew law for Japanese.

Other witnesses were Floyd Schmoce and Ralph Seaton, who testified that they had seen Hirabayashi out of his home after 8 o'clock at night after the curfew order was effective.

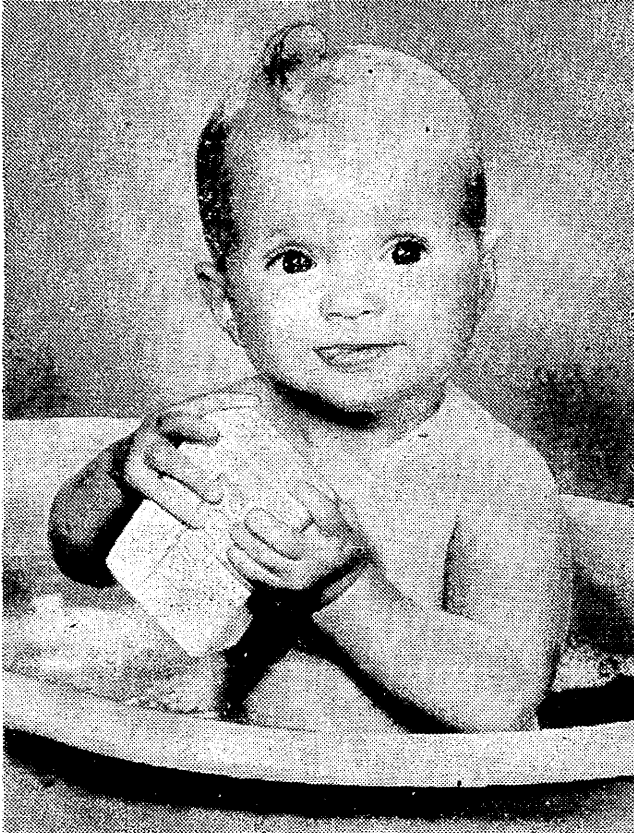
Hirabayashi is a Quaker, a member of the Friends' Society.

VITAMIN NEEDS TO BE OUTLINED

The importance of vitamins in the daily diet, as a means of obtaining needed energy and protective elements will be discussed at sessions of The Times-DeBoth cooking school this week when Miss Jessie Marie DeBoth, lecturer introduces "Super-Kaps," vitamins featured by Sears, Roebuck & Co.

Flyers, Forced Down in Snow, 'Mush' to Safety

HEADQUARTERS ALASKA DEFENSE COMMAND, Oct. 20.—(AP)—Five United States pilots were celebrating here because they can "mush" as well as fly.

The five ran into a blizzard late last week in their fighter planes. They ran out of gas while trying to reach the safety of an airport and finally made belly landings in clear areas that appeared providentially through the curtain of flying flakes. None of the planes was damaged seriously. Without so much as a snowshoe, they hiked a half dozen miles over the soft snow of an inhospitable terrain to the nearest village.

They received supplies by parachute the morning after their landing.

Empty Flour Sacks Boost Lunch Fund

To swell the Seattle Parent-Teacher Association's school lunch fund, the Fisher Flouring Mills Company will pay 10 cents for each empty Fisher's Fine-Spun Flour sack turned in with an entry blank at The Times-DeBoth cake-baking contest at the Civic Auditorium Friday afternoon.

F. R. Refuses To Upset Order Of Court-Martial

WASHINGTON, Oct. 20.—(AP)—President Roosevelt vetoed yesterday a bill which would have authorized him to vacate a court-martial sentence under which 1st Lieut. William J. Tepsic of the 17th Field Artillery was dismissed from the Army last December 14.

Lieutenant Tepsic was tried and dismissed from the service for applying to his own use about 65 cents worth of gasoline. The House passed the measure October 6 on a finding of its military affairs committee that the treatment of Tepsic, who entered the federal service when the Pennsylvania National Guard was inducted, "smacks of treatment unduly harsh and unjust."

Tepsic's offense occurred May 10, 1941.

The measure vetoed today also would have authorized the President to reinstate Tepsic as a first lieutenant as of December 15, 1941.

Mr. Roosevelt said in his veto message that he was directing the secretary of war to appoint a board to investigate Tepsic's entire record and present qualifications as an officer and would take whatever action the facts warranted with reference to a new appointment. Tepsic was inducted and now is a private.
