DAIRYMEN'S PAY SUBSIDY URGED

A wage-subsidy plan under which dairymen of the nation would receive \$400,000,000 to enable them to raise wages of their help and stop the flow of manpower from the farms to war industries...

"Farmers do not want subsidies," Dr. Prior said. "They are individualists. But this situation must be met or we face grave trouble."

Dr. Prior disclosed the plan in an address at the annual meeting of the Enumclaw Cooperative Creamery Company, the state's oldest dairy cooperative group in Graham Grange Hall, near Puyallup.

Labor Is Big Problem: Wartime problems of the dairy men, chiefly deriving from lack of help on the farms, occupied the attention of the dairymen through the all-day meeting...

How are work-weary dairy operators going to carry on in the face of the increasing manpower shortages? Will the dwindling number of veterinarians be able to preserve the health of Washington's dairy herds?

"The morale of the American dairy farmer has never been so low as it is today," said Dr. Prior. Dr. Prior is a vice president of the National Dairy Council and is in close touch with the industry's problems elsewhere...

Long Hours Cited: "During this past summer dairy men put in the longest hours, and the hardest work they ever have in their lives," he said. Next year, many dairy farmers will plant only such crops for herd feeding as they can handle themselves, and they will be forced to cut down the size of their herds to the point where they, and available members of their families, can milk them...

Weary High-School Youths Glad 'Ordeal' Is Finished

A very tired tornado lifted its head feebly and cheered as it rumbled within range of the "dimmed-out bright lights" of Seattle shortly before midnight last night. Drowsiness was knuckled out of weary eyes as window shades all along the seven-car special from Eastern Washington went up, and 387 Seattle high school youths chorused: "Boy, there's home!"

There Was Some Fun: "We were walking around in dust six inches deep," said one. "They fed us corn and beans at every meal except breakfast," chimed in another. "I slept on a canvas cot without any mattress." "Too much work. A lot too much." Still, for every bitter voice, there were two cheerful ones. It had been work, but it had been fun, too, and farmers who needed a lift had got it.

Japs' Refusal Of Farm Work Probed

WASHINGTON, Oct. 27.—(UP)—Representative Pierce, Democrat, Oregon, said today the War Relocation Authority had agreed to make an immediate investigation of the Tule Lake, Calif., Japanese relocation camp to determine the accuracy of reports that aliens there were persuading American-born Japanese in the camp to refuse to accept farm work in the neighborhood.

Average Pick 200 Boxes: Average pick for the trip was 200 boxes, and, as most of the apples picked were the smaller Winesaps, the price paid averaged 10 cents a box. With train fare and board and room totaling \$10.90, profits were not enormous. High man among the high school pupils was 16-year-old John Van Devanter of Lincoln, who turned in 320 boxes to the checkers. His feat was topped only by that of the adult counselor from Roosevelt, R. H. Rehbeck, who set a blistering pace for the boys by whipping from tree to tree to the tune of 384 boxes.

Supervising the group were Eugene Dilis, School Board employment representative, and 15 advisers from the high-school faculties. They looked a little haggard as they sat in the lurching cars, surrounded by snoring, pharng, mountains of blanket rolls, and such miscellaneous debris as discarded paper cups, old magazines, battered hats, stray garments, and shattered light globes which had been unscrewed and accidentally dropped.

DAD'S LETTER IS BOY'S TREASURE

(See Page 14 for wirephoto) By Associated Press. ARLINGTON, Mass., Oct. 27.—Jackie Shea, 5 years old, has a letter he never will part with—a letter that said, "If I don't get back..."

"Dear Jackie: This is the first letter I have ever written directly to my little son and I am thrilled to know you can read it all by yourself. If you like some of the words, I am sure it will be because I do not write plainly. Mother will help you in that case, I am sure. I was certainly glad to hear your voice over the long-distance telephone. It sounded as though I were right there in the living room with you. You sounded as though you missed your daddy very much. I miss you, too, more than any one will ever know. It is too bad that war could not have been delayed a few more years so that I could grow up again with you and do all the things I planned to do when you were old enough to go to school."

"I thought how nice it would be for me to come home early in the afternoon and play ball with you and go mountain climbing and see the trees and brooks and learn all about woodcraft, hunting, fishing, swimming and other things like that..."

"When you are a little bigger you will know why your daddy is not home so much any more. You know we have a big country, and we have ideals as to how people should live and enjoy the riches of it, and how each is born with equal rights to life, freedom and the pursuit of happiness. Unfortunately, there are some countries in the world where they don't have these ideals, where a boy cannot grow up to be what he wants to be with no limits on his opportunities to be a great man, such as a great priest, statesman, doctor, soldier, businessman, etc..."

"Fighting for the defense of our country, ideals, homes and honor is an honor and a duty which your daddy has to do before he can come home to settle down with you and mother."

"Don't ever be a quitter, either in sports or in your business or profession when you grow up. Get all the education you can. Stay close to mother and follow her advice. Obey her in everything, no matter how much you may at times disagree. She knows what is best and will never let you down or lead you away from the right and honorable things of life."

"If I don't get back, you will have to be mother's protector, because you will be the only one she has."

Jackie and his mother are living in Arlington with her parents. Shea, a graduate of Boston College, was executive officer of the Quantico Naval Air Station in Quantico and commanded the Miami Air Station before being assigned to the Wasp.

WENATCHEE, Oct. 27.—(UP)—The United States Employment Service today studied reports of field men who said 75 per cent of Central Washington's apple orchards were being "over-picked" and the remaining 25 per cent could be lost to dust storms.

Harold Brogger, executive secretary of the Farm Labor Supply Council, said reports from the field showed that three-fourths of the apple district had too many pickers for the number of apples still on the trees, and that a backlog of apples was mounting in the orchards because of labor shortage at warehouses in some districts.

The most critical labor-shortage areas were Dryden, Washburn, Leavenworth, Entiat, Okanogan, Oroville, Tonasket and Brewster, Brogger said.
