Shipowner Liable for Wages Of Seamen Injured on Shore

Under the legislation, Black added, "a person may be defrauded although he parts with something of no measurable value at all."

Justice Roberts dissented and Justice Murphy did not participate.

The litigation applied to Philip Lepowitch and Marvin Spector who, the Justice Department charged, falsely pretended to be F. B. I. agents and demanded of Mrs. Adele Silk that she give them information concerning the whereabouts of Abe Zaldman. Further details were not given in the petition or the Supreme Court opinion.

To Review I. C. C. Ruling

Among other actions the court: 1. Agreed to review the Interstate Commerce Commission order approving a proposed merger of what were described as the principal motor carriers operating along the Atlantic coast into the "largest common carrier of property by motor vehicle in the United States." This description was given by the counsel for the Agriculture Department, the Farm Bureau Federation and McLean Trucking Company, Inc., of Fayetteville, N. C., in urging review. A three-judge Federal Court in New York upheld the I. C. C. order.

2. Refused to review a decision holding that provisions of the 1938 Civil Aeronautics Act, requiring a federal certificate of airworthiness, may constitutionally be applied to a plane flight entirely within one state. Validity of the regulations was challenged by Cort A. Rosenman, an amateur plane builder, who was convicted in the Federal District Court at Salt Lake City of an offense of \$1 (one dollar) on each of four offenses.

3. Agreed to review a decision striking conductors, engineers and firemen from committing acts of violence against the Toledo, Peoria & Western Railroad after a dispute over wages and working conditions. An injunction granted January 3, 1942, by the Federal District Court at Quincy, Ill., was sustained by the Federal Circuit Court of Appeals at Chicago.

4. Agreed to review a decision by a three-judge Federal Court in New Jersey holding that it lacked jurisdiction to enjoin enforcement of the Emergency Price Control Act. In dismissing a challenge of the constitutionality of the act by a group of Northern New Jersey meat dealers, the three-judge court said that the law set up an emergency court of appeals here to pass on legal controversies involving the legislation.

5. Affirmed a decision holding constitutional a provision of the Pennsylvania Corporate Net Income Tax Act applying to the allocation of wages and salaries and gross receipts. The action was taken in an order, without a written opinion, which merely said that the judgment appealed from was affirmed.

6. Refused to review a decision approving a plan for the reorganization of the Chicago & Northwestern Railway Company worked out by the I. C. C.

G. E. and Westinghouse Cases Are Dismissed

WASHINGTON, April 19.—(AP)—The Supreme Court dismissed today an appeal from a decision which declined to direct the General Electric Company of Schenectady, N. Y., and the Westinghouse Electric & Manufacturing Company of Bloomfield, N. J., to abolish a 23 percent reduction in the retail price of the 40, 50 and 60 watt incandescent lamps.

Dismissal was ordered on the authority of previous Supreme Court decisions. There was no written opinion.

Seeking reinstatement of the higher prices, the Jewel Incandescent Lamp Company, Inc., of East Newark, N. J., contended the reduction was ordered "for the obvious purpose of driving the independent lamp manufacturers out of business and for the ultimate purpose of subjecting the public, for years to come, to arbitrarily fixed high prices which thus would become possible by the complete elimination of all competition."

An anti-trust suit against General Electric and Westinghouse was filed by the Justice Department on January 27, 1941. The companies were charged with acquiring a monopoly in the manufacture, distribution and sale of incandescent electric lamps.

After the trial had continued four days, the Jewel company said, "the court announced that the case would be adjourned at the request of the War Department because, assertedly, a continuation thereof would or might interfere or hinder the war efforts of General Electric."

Later, General Electric and Westinghouse were said to have announced a reduction from 13 cents to 10 cents a lamp, effective September 1, 1942.

"This simultaneous price reduction," the Jewel company said, "was pointedly limited to the 40, 50 and 60 watt lamps—the bread and butter lamps of the independent lamp manufacturers."

The Jewel company sought to intervene in the litigation and to have the higher prices restored. Both were denied by the Federal District Court of New Jersey, which said "there is no suggestion as to how the public could be indemnified in case the Jewel company should fail to sustain its position."

Bank of America Fails To Get Labor-Case Review

WASHINGTON, April 19.—(AP)—The Bank of America National Trust & Savings Association of San Francisco, described as the fourth largest bank in the United States, failed today to obtain a Supreme Court review of a Labor Board order holding the bank to be subject to the National Labor Relations Act.

The financial institution challenges a board order holding that E. C. Washer, a trust-department employee at Chico, Calif., and ten automotive messengers in the San Francisco area had been discriminatorily discharged for union activity. Their reinstatement, with back pay, was ordered and the ruling was upheld by the Ninth Federal Circuit Court of Appeals.

REFUGEES ASK FOR FREE SPAIN

Chicago Daily News Foreign Service MONTEVIDEO, April 19.—(Special Radio)—The voice of republican Spain thundered its demand that Spain be returned to its people at a mammoth meeting held yesterday in Montevideo, commemorating the republic's 12th anniversary.

"We are representatives of Spanish peoples," cried Martinez Barrio, the last president of the Spanish Cortes (Parliament). "We were overthrown by force of arms, not legally. We represent the real will of Spain."

25,000 at Meeting

The meeting, called by the republican Spanish associations of Uruguay and Argentina, mobilized upwards of 25,000 people and fused diverse Spanish internal political elements. The united front against Fascism and Caudillo Francisco Franco, presented at the meeting, was symbolized by speakers for the Basques, Catalans and Galicians, besides Martinez Barrio and Gen. Jose Miaja, the defender of Madrid. The latter two flew from Mexico especially for the meeting.

Martinez Barrio called for republican Spain's recognition by the Allies, thus confirming the earlier announcement that a Spanish government in exile would be formed by calling a republican Parliament, probably in Mexico, "when propitious." He said that it is as much right for republican Spain to be recognized as Free France or Free Italy.

No Quislings Wanted

The meeting's anti-Fascist core was interpreted by Martinez Barrio who said: "There is no use defeating Hitler and Mussolini and leaving Quislings in power."

Every effort was made by the organizers to include all parties in the meeting but it did not enlist the active support of the Communists.

Making a plea for liberty of Spanish refugees in North Africa, thousands of leaflets were distributed calling for "free men."

Ewing Again Fails To Get Review

WASHINGTON, April 19.—(AP)—Orman W. Ewing, former Democratic national committeeman from Utah, failed today for the second time to obtain a Supreme Court review of his conviction on a charge of raping a 19-year-old government worker here October 26, 1941.

The tribunal refused on March 16 to review the 8 to 24 year sentence and today it declined to reconsider that action.

In his petition for rehearing, Ewing contended through his attorney that "a fraud has been committed" upon the Supreme Court, the Federal District Court here in which he was convicted and the Court of Appeals which upheld the conviction.

Volunteer Workers Refurbish 'V' Square

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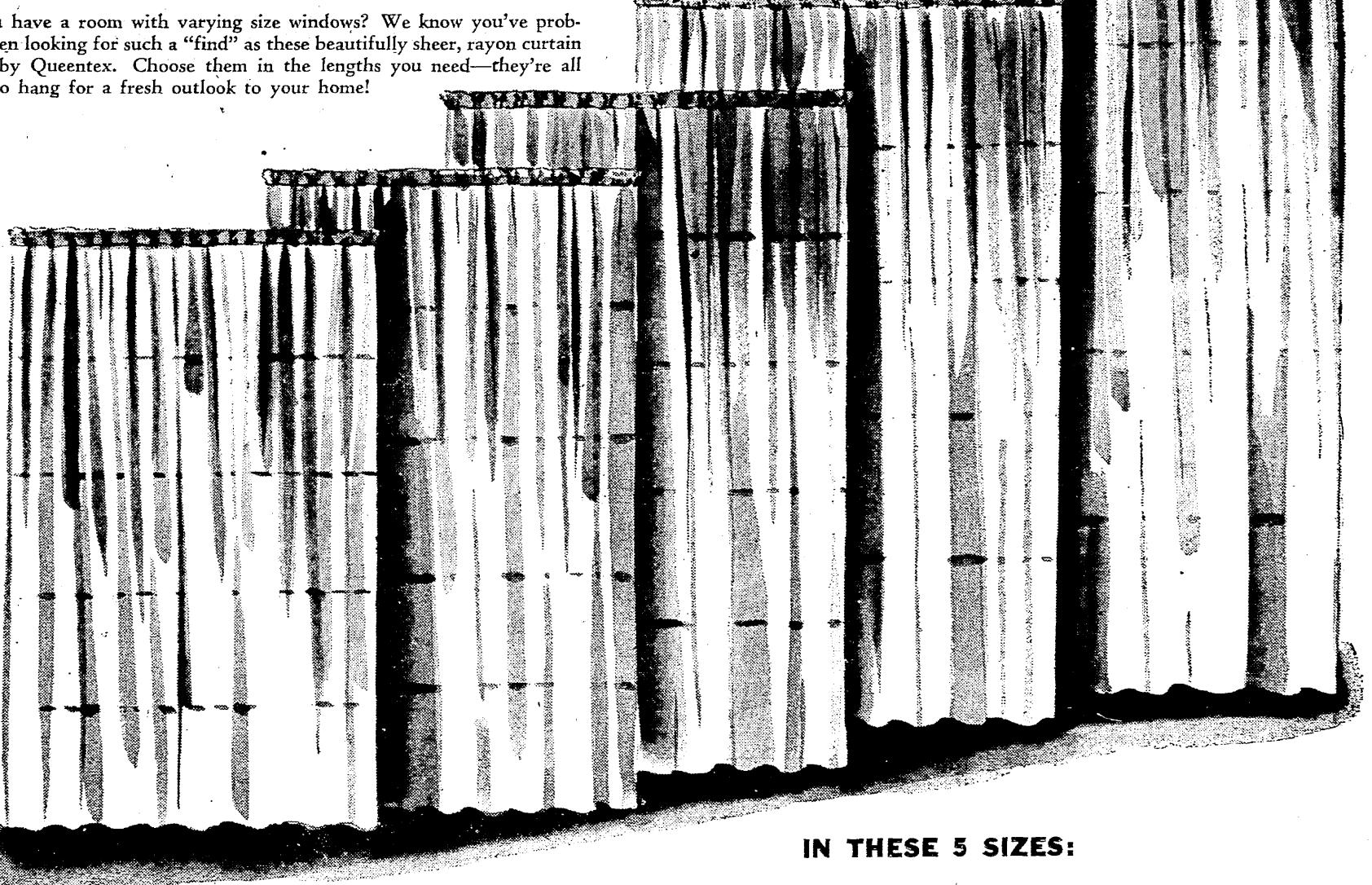

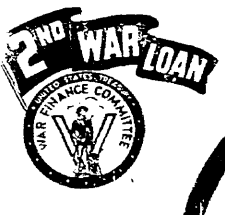


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
