

# MAKE JAPANESE NON-CITIZENS

—Senator Urges

WASHINGTON, April 23.—(UP)—Senator Tom Stewart, Democrat, Tennessee, demanded in the Senate yesterday that the courts review the citizenship status of Japanese-Americans and deprive them of the protection of the 14th Amendment to the Constitution, which defines citizenship.

Stewart called for immediate passage of his bill to place all Japanese in this country in custody. He added he hoped Congress ultimately would "take away every right of citizenship these people have." The bill, introduced February 25, is still in committee.

"They cannot and never will be honest," Stewart said. "The execution of these American airmen confirms that statement. They are unworthy of the rights of citizens."

### Condemn Executions

SALT LAKE CITY, April 23.—(UP)—Execution of members of the Doolittle bomb-Tokyo mission by the Japanese government was condemned yesterday by leaders of the Japanese-American Citizens League, which has its national headquarters here.

The league weekly newspaper, The Pacific Citizen, carried a condemnation of the executions in this week's issue yesterday.

## California Senate Joins

### In Condemning Japanese

SACRAMENTO, April 23.—(UP)—The State senate yesterday unanimously passed a resolution condemning the Japanese government for its execution of American flyers captured in the Tokyo raid, terming the act "uncivilized, cruel, brutal and an act of barbarism unparalleled in the annals of modern warfare."

The resolution also directed the secretary of the Senate to extend to the bereaved families and friends the "heartfelt sympathy of the millions of citizens throughout California."

## Execution Just,

### Says Berlin Radio

LONDON, April 22.—(UP)—The Berlin radio, commenting on the execution of American airmen by the Japanese, said yesterday: "The murder has been committed exclusively on the side of those who, with their air terror against women and children, spurn all the laws of humanity."

"The execution of the American assassins will be considered a just punishment by every thinking person."

## U. S. Will Guard Against Cartels

NEW YORK, April 23.—War-created monopolies in American industry, which convert to peacetime production, must not have the chance to reestablish the cartel system of international trade agreements, Tom C. Clark, assistant attorney-general of the Anti-Trust Division of the Department of Justice, said last night.

Clark spoke before the American Business Congress.

# Ouster of Duce and King Expected After Tunis Falls

Chicago Daily News Foreign Service LONDON, April 23.—The latest report circulating in Vatican City, as conveyed here, declares that there will be a political upheaval in Italy immediately after the Allies' total victory in Tunisia.

It is predicted that King Victor Emmanuel will abdicate and be succeeded by the Prince of Piedmont while Mussolini will be "liquidated" and the responsibility for the government will be taken over by Marshal Pietro Badoglio.

The story is not exactly new but it is interesting that it should persist even after the recent Hitler-Mussolini conference.

Demands of Mussolini It is now known that the meeting was held at Mussolini's request and that Il Duce made the most extensive complaints and demands, the bulk of which, however, were not met.

These may well be preparing airfields on which the Luftwaffe, now based in Tunisia, Sicily and Sardinia, can fall back when the Tunis battle is ended, but are not much comfort for Italians.

Meanwhile, Il Duce has been told he must make his own arrangements to defend Italy with his own armed forces, it is reliably learned.

The possibility that Italy will make an independent surrender to the Allies is still being discussed in political circles and it is believed that the Italians would be encouraged to lay down their arms if they could be assured that their country would be allowed to continue to exist as an independent state after the war.

The Pope's earnest hope that Italy will and can be disengaged before the war sweeps even more fiercely over her lands cannot ever be forgotten. It is considered likely that the Spanish foreign minister, Count Francisco Gomez de Jordana, made his recent offer to act as peace mediator only after consulting the Vatican.

But it must be borne in mind that the Pope's influence over the German government is zero—that is now an accepted fact—and that the Pope himself, while fiercely anti-Nazi, holds strongly to his belief, begotten from many years spent in Germany, that a strong Germany must be preserved after the war.

Gov. Stassen Eager To Answer Navy Call

ST. PAUL, Minn., April 23.—Gov. Harold E. Stassen of Minnesota said today he welcomed the Navy's order calling him to active duty April 29 "because I feel this is a war of my generation, and that I must do my part." Stassen had been considered presidential timber, and his call to active duty apparently eliminated the possibility that he would seek the Republican nomination.

Earlier, he had said he would not run.

Stassen, 36 years old, the nation's youngest governor, said he had been expecting the call, which came yesterday, and was "ready to respond."

# Hold Up Fathers' Draft—Wheeler

WASHINGTON, April 23.—Senator Burton K. Wheeler, Democrat, Montana, said yesterday that shipping facilities can take only 1,964,000 American troops overseas this year, and therefore drafting of fathers should not be permitted until January 1, 1944.

# Try Lumbering, Nutrition Aides Of O.P.A. Told

WASHINGTON, April 23.—(AP)—A Western congressman suggests that the "nutrition experts of the price administration" take a practical course in logging camps before they decide to cut down the rations of the lumberjacks.

Representative Norman, Republican, Washington, wrote O. P. A. Administrator Prentiss Brown that, as a former lumberjack himself, he could assure the "nutrition experts" that "if they would swing on the end of a crosscut saw in Washington woods for a week or so, they would soon discover why a logger needs at least six pounds of meat a week and why these loggers, to continue peak production, ought to have ten or 15 pounds of meat a week each."

"Our soldiers can't fight their best on short rations, like they endured in Bataan, and our loggers can't produce the lumber and plywood needed for war unless their rations are enough to keep them in fighting trim," he added.

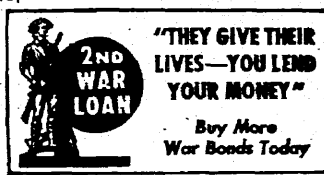

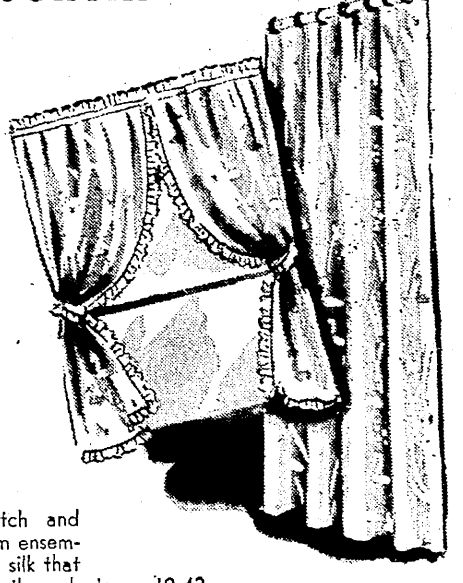
