## CEMENT WORKERS GET PAY BOOST

In the first case in which a regional War Labor Board has unanimously approved a union-maintenance clause in a work contract, the Northwest board has issued a directive in the case of 82 employees of the Lehigh Portland Cement Company plant at Metaline, Pend Oreille County, it was announced today by Dr. George Bernard Noble, chairman.

Issues at stake between the International Union of Mine, Mill & Smelter Workers, Congress of Industrial Organizations, and the company, which has 13 plants producing 8 per cent of the country's cement, were wage increases, retroactive date of the increase, union shop, the union check-off and a military clause.

The board granted the 82 employees a 6-cent-an-hour wage increase, retroactive to May 15, 1942, on the basis of the "Little Steel" formula. The previous rate for common labor was 70 cents an hour.

The union-maintenance clause recognizes value of stability and of non-coercion by these two provisions, Dr. Noble said. All employees who were members of the union last September 18, when an employee vote chose the Mine, Mill & Smelter Workers union in preference to an American Federation of Labor group, must maintain their membership. Other employees may or may not join the union as they wish, but, once in, must maintain their membership. It is the first time in the history of the W. L. B. that industry members of a regional board have approved such a stand.

Both the check-off proposal—whereby the employer deducts union dues from pay—and a military clause were denied by the board. Previous seniority clauses already cared for the military situation, it was ruled.

## Packer Confesses Meat-Price Vilations

YAKIMA, May 27.—(AP)—On a charge of violating price ceilings on the sale of meat, George F. Siegel, 72 years old, president of the Siegel Brothers Packing Company of Tappanish, was arrested yesterday by federal officers. He pleaded guilty when arraigned before United States Commissioner Thomas Granger.

## Army Offers Commissions To Health Aides

Army commissions in grades up to major are now available to men professionally trained in protecting the health of industrial workers, it was announced today at the headquarters of Maj. Gen. Kenyon A. Joyce, commanding general of the Ninth Service Command, at Fort Douglas, Utah.

Applicants must have a bachelor's degree, preferably in chemistry or chemical or mechanical engineering, from a college or university of recognized standing, together with four years actual experience in industrial hygiene engineering, including use of materials and apparatus for environmental studies, evaluation and control of hazards, ventilation requirements, procurement and maintenance of protective devices, or the preparation of engineering reports and recommendations.

Limited service men between the ages of 35 and 45 are acceptable. Prospective candidates, residing in Washington, should contact the field representative of the Seattle Officer Procurement District, 904 Lloyd Building.

Commissioned applicants will serve as inspectors and supervisors of plant hygiene programs at Army installations.

## Renton High Gives \$14,000 Concert

Climaxing a two months' war bond and stamp drive, Renton High School music students recently presented a "bond concert" which netted more than \$14,000, it was announced today.

During the "jeep" drive, \$11,574.90 in stamps and bonds were purchased in roll rooms of the junior-senior high school at Renton. Added to sales at the concert, this makes a total of \$25,876.40 sold through the school—or enough to pay for 28 jeeps.

Taking part in the concert was the senior high band, the junior-senior high orchestra, and the combined junior-senior high chorus, under direction of Randall Rockhill.

## Ruby Elzy to Sing At First Methodist

Ruby Elzy, Negro singer who has the leading role in Gershwin's "Foggy and Bess," at the Moore Theatre next week, will sing sacred songs and spirituals at the First Methodist Church's morning service at 11 o'clock Sunday morning. Miss Elzy's manager wrote to the church, telling of her Methodist background, and suggested she be invited to sing at a service there, the church office said. She was invited immediately and when she arrived in Portland, Or., Tuesday night, she telephoned her acceptance.

## Make Japs Pay Own Way, Say Officials

## STATE TOPS BOND VICTORY CORPS QUOTA 66.8 PCT. SEEKS RECRUITS

Washington State exceeded all war-bond-sales expectations during the Second War Loan drive, when \$142,195,574 of all types of United States savings securities were subscribed for by citizens here against an assigned quota of \$90,091,000, it was revealed today by war-savings and war-finance committee officials. The report is exclusive of commercial bank purchases.

The report shows that King County achieved 166.8 per cent of its \$48,245,860 quota, with final sales of \$80,475,884.

The popular Series E bond accounted for \$28,517,100 of the state total, while King County sales of this bond totaled \$10,822,556.
