F. B. I. TO HOLD MEETING HERE

The quarterly police conference sponsored by the Federal Bureau of Investigation will be held in the Chamber of Commerce Auditorium Tuesday, June 15, with representatives of all local law-enforcement agencies attending. Similar conferences will be held in nine other places in the state this month.

Purpose of the meetings is to discuss work on common problems of law enforcement, including sabotage, espionage, subversive activities and alien-enemy control, with the F. B. I. as the coordinating agency.

Eggs of All Grades to Go Up 2 Cents

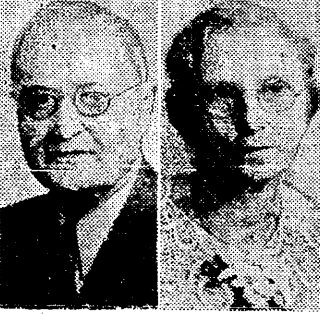
The price of eggs, all grades and all sizes, will go up 2 cents a dozen tomorrow, Dr. James K. Hall, district office of Price Administration price officer, announced yesterday.

The increase applies through the entire merchandising of eggs, the poultry raiser and farmer getting 2 cents more and the price being passed along to the consumer.

"The regulation provides for the customary fluctuation in seasonal prices in eggs, according to production," Dr. Hall said.

Ceiling prices for eggs sold loose are 2 cents a dozen lower than for cartoned.

Hampson is a retired member of the Seattle staff of the United States Customs Service. The couple reside at 7922 12th Ave. S. W.

Benjamin Franklin Hampson and Rena Mary Tyler were married in Chicago on June 7, 1893, and nine years later moved to Seattle. Hampson joined the Customs Service in 1910, and at the time of his retirement in 1940 was chief liquidator at the Port of Seattle. After his retirement, the couple took a long-planned automobile tour, and visited friends and relatives in many sections of the country.

Members of the University Presbyterian Church, the Hampsons have been diligent church workers. Hampson served as a Sunday School superintendent for 45 years.

The Hampsons have five children: Chester C. of Denver, Colo.; Floyd F. of Yakima; A. House Project May Set New Speed Record

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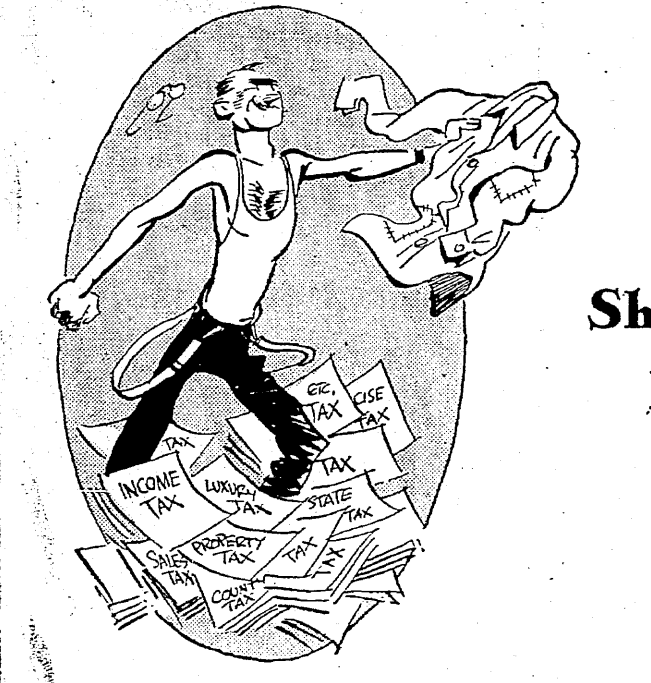
