"The outlook seems to be that in the bear future the art center of the world will be shifted to this country.

"The most pathetic episode of my travels was that, as I was crossing Montana, I read in a newspaper the anhouncement of the death of Sculptor St. Gaudens. The nation is poorer for the loss of that master of sculpture, and it will be many years before we see the like of so gifted a man.

Canal Commission Pays No Attention to Request From Title Trust Co. to Reopen Bids on Abstract Work,

Taking no notice of the protest filed by the Title Trust Company the King County Rivers and Harbors Commission yesterday, at a secret meeting, confirmed the contract made with the Osborne-Tremper Company to furnish the abstracts for the Lake Washington canal assessment district, and the contract was signed by the commission and the abstract company at noon today. The contract calls for the work to be done at 10 cents a description and will amount to about \$30,000.

When asked this morning why the commission had ignored the protest of the Title Trust Company against limiting the competition in bidding upon the work to the Osborne-Tremper Company and the Booth-Whittlesey-Hanford Company, Judge John P. Hoyt, president of the commission, said that the written protest received by the commission arrived too late for consideration, as he considered that the contract was already legally in force when the resolution accepting the Osborne-Tremper bid was adopted at last Tuesday's meeting. For that reason, he said, the commission placed the Title Trust Company's letter on file without making any reply.

C. S. Wiley, general manager of the Title Trust Company, when informed to-day that no notice had been taken of his protest against what he considered the high-handed methods of the commission in excluding all but two abstract companies from competing upon the work, made the following statement:
