McCaffrey, who was granted two months' time to provide for his wife and baby before beginning a year's term in the Bridewell for stealing from the United States mails, tried to begin sentence today but failed. Now he has to wait until the end of September before he can fulfill his promise to Judge K. M. Landis, who granted him the sixty days of grace.

MIKKELSON PARTY REPORTED TO BE SAFE

Prof. V. Stefanssen, Who Headed Expedition in Search of New Arctic Land, Brings Out Good News.

POSITIVE RESULTS GAINED BY EXPLORERS

Sailed in Duchess of Bedford From Victoria for Beaufort Sea in Quest of Scientific Knowledge.

FORT GIBBON, Tuesday, Sept. 10.—Definite news has been received here that Capt. Mikkelson and his party of the Duchess of Bedford, the Anglo-American Arctic expedition, are safe. Moreover, it appears that they have accomplished their purpose for which they went to the North, although it is not stated what discoveries they have made in their search for the supposed continent in the Beaufort Sea.

It is reported that the Mikkelson party made the trip north over the ice and were accompanied by several Eskimos. They encountered many hardships during the trip.

Prof. Stefanssen made the almost impossible trip from Herschel Island up the Mackenzie River and down the Beaufort Sea.

The schooner Duchess of Bedford left Victoria May 20, 1906. The vessel was of sixty-six tons capacity and the expedition consisted of a scientific party of research in the Arctic was in charge of Dr. V. Stefanssen.

It was planned to establish a winter station on the northwest shore of Bank Island, from which point zoological, geographical, ethnological and hydrographical work would be conducted until the spring of 1907.

It was fully expected that the trip would occupy two years. One party was to remain at the station during the winter and last spring. Another mission which the explorers hoped to accomplish was to ascertain what became of the ship Investigator, which, under Capt. MacLure, disappeared in 1852.

Claims for damages amounting to \$100,000 on account of deaths and injuries occasioned last spring by the collapse of the pier at Stone's Landing, when a crowd of Tacoma spectators overweighed the wharf, will be resisted by the county commissioners.

RHODE ISLANDERS VISIT JAMESTOWN EXPOSITION

Exercises Held in Commemoration of Ninety-Fourth Anniversary of Battle of Lake Erie.

NORFOLK, Va., Tuesday, Sept. 16.—Rhode Islanders took possession of the Jamestown Exposition today and held interesting exercises in commemoration of the ninety-fourth anniversary of the battle of Lake Erie, which resulted in a victory for the American fleet under the command of Commodore Moringo Ferris, a native of Rhode Island.

At 11 o'clock this morning Gov. James H. Smith and the other visitors from Rhode Island were escorted to the Auditorium, where the exercises of the day were held.

A parade of troops was held in the afternoon, followed by a public reception at the Rhode Island building, one of the handsomest of the state edifices at the exposition.

JAPAN COOL OVER VANCOUVER RIOTS

Official of Foreign Office Declares Mikado Has Every Confidence in Dominion Government's Sincerity.

RETALIATION WILL NOT REMEDY TROUBLE

Treaty With Great Britain Covers British Columbia and Oriental Newspapers Are Not Alarmed by Outbreak.

TOKYO, Tuesday, Sept. 10.—The foreign office has received a dispatch from the Japanese consul-general at Ottawa, saying that the Canadian government will express its regret for the occurrence at Vancouver and take steps to prevent a recurrence at Kyoto.

"We have the utmost confidence in the Canadian government and we also have in that of America. Commissioner Ishii's dispatch says that the disturbance will soon subside and there is no reason to expect its repetition.

"Our information is that the outbreak, like the riot at Seattle and elsewhere, is the result of the League's anti-Japanese agitation, created by false and exaggerated reports concerning conditions in Korea and the attitude and sentiment of Japan. The foreign office is not disturbed by the Vancouver affair and is quite confident that everything will be done to protect the Japanese."

Trouble Not Feared. The outbreak of the serious anti-Japanese demonstration at Vancouver, B. C., published in Tokyo evening papers, like the government officials, regard the incident as a trifling and unimportant affair.

The agitation in British Columbia against the Japanese is much older than the outbreak at Vancouver. It has been prevented hitherto by the firm attitude of the Dominion government.

Retaliation will not remedy the trouble. Our treaty with Great Britain, which says that the Canadian government undoubtedly will take measures against similar retaliatory actions, and concludes as follows:

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"The subjects of each of the two high contracting parties shall have full liberty to enter, travel or reside in the Dominion and possessions of the other high contracting party and shall enjoy full and perfect protection for their persons and property."

OUTBREAKS DO NOT SURPRISE LONDONERS

LONDON, Tuesday, Sept. 10.—The news of the attacks on the Japanese and Chinese at Vancouver did not surprise the Londoners. They said that they had long expected an outbreak against Asiatics in Canada, but they have the greatest confidence that the British government will be able to suppress any further outbreaks.

At the same time, the officials realize that the most serious problem has arisen, particularly as the feeling appears to be strong against the subjects of Great Britain in the United States. It will require most careful handling, for whatever action is taken is likely to be regarded as a precedent.

WASHINGTON REGARDS SITUATION AS GRAVE

WASHINGTON, Tuesday, Sept. 10.—It has been impossible to obtain any impression from the state department regarding the situation in the Pacific. The Japanese and other Orientals in British Columbia. But here, where the effect of the smaller riots of the past is felt, the situation is regarded as grave.

An amusing feature is that it was the British press and British public opinion that first set up its head against the outrages in San Francisco and did everything possible to make the work of the Roosevelt administration easier.

It is believed here that there is strong reason to believe that the situation in Japan and Great Britain. The Dominion government is said to be very much impressed by the riotous outbreaks in British Columbia.

PEACE REIGNS IN ORIENTAL QUARTERS

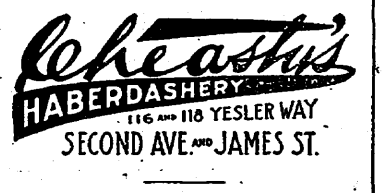

The Canadian law provides that Chinese against retail trade of \$500 each on entering, which few can produce. Students, merchants and professional men, however, are exempted.

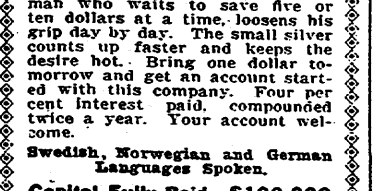

PITTSBURGH, Tuesday, Sept. 10.—Walter Christie, president of the Christie Iron Works of New York, manufacturer of the Christie automobile, was seriously injured in a race at Brunoto Island, Pa., today.

It was the first day of the events under the American Automobile Association. The first test of the accidents happened in the fifty-mile endurance race for touring cars, fully equipped.

Reinerstone was in the rear. All the other cars having passed him. Just before he crossed the front right wheel tire came off. His machine bounded into the air, tumbled completely over and landed on its side.

Christie's body was injured. He was thrown from the car and landed on his back. He was taken to the hospital.
