GERMANS TAKE 3 AEGEAN ISLANDS

LONDON, Nov. 19.—(AP)—The occupation of three small islands in the Aegean—Ikaria, Lipsos and Patmos—was reported by the Germans today as a sequel to the loss by the British of Leros in the stepping-stone Battle of the Eastern Mediterranean.

An undisclosed number of prisoners was reported seized in Lipsos and Patmos, small rocky isles north of Leros in the Dodecanese. The broadcast said these also were garrisoned by Italians.

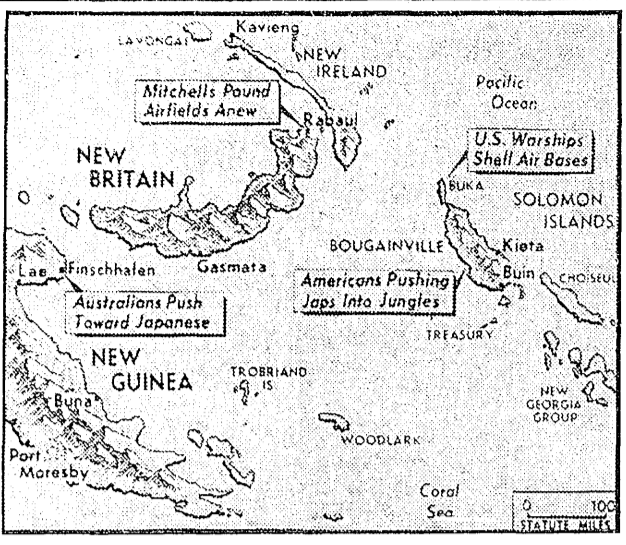
Allies Gain on Guinea, Bougainville

SOUTHWEST PACIFIC ALLIED HEADQUARTERS, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Text of today's communique:

"Northwestern Sector: "Dutch New Guinea. Our medium units at night bombed the warehouse and jetty area at Kaimana and attacked the Utorom airfield, starting large fires at both targets. Two barges off the coast at Kipia were strafed and wrecked and five coastal vessels sunk in the Aroe Islands were attacked.

"Timor: Our medium units bombed Manatolu Village, starting fires. "Northeastern Sector: "New Britain: Rabaul. Our medium units in a pre-dawn attack bombed the Lakunai airfield and dispersal areas with good coverage.

Zhoinirovka, Ilyintsy and Rudnaya Ilyinskaya. "In the Dnieper Bend, southwest of Dnepropetrovsk, our troops continued waging engagements with the enemy, in the course of which they improved their positions.

"In other sectors of the front, reconnaissance activities and artillery and mortar duels took place. "On November 17, our troops on all fronts disabled or destroyed 70 German tanks. Thirteen enemy planes were brought down in air combat or by anti-aircraft fire."

Jap Forces At Bougainville Face Disaster

Says Task Force Chief

By SPENCER DAVIS Associated Press Foreign Staff ABOARD A UNITED STATES TASK GROUP FLAGSHIP OFF BOUGAINVILLE, Solomons, Nov. 18.—(Delayed)—The American naval task force raid on Buka demonstrated the Japanese won't be able to get the bulk of their estimated 40,000 troops off Bougainville Island, the commander of the task force said here today.

Capt. Arleigh A. Burke, commander of the group, led a roving light surface force packing a heavy weight punch in a bold offensive sweep of waters between Rabaul, enemy feeder base on New Britain, and Buka Island.

RUSSIAN LONDON, Nov. 19.—(AP)—The Moscow radio, recorded here by the Soviet monitor, broadcast this communique yesterday.

"Our troops of the First Ukrainian Sector, continuing to develop their offensive in two days' fierce fighting, broke the enemy's resistance and by the end of November 17 captured the town and railway junction of Korosten.

"In the area of Zhitomir and Korostyshev our troops repulsed attacks launched by large forces of enemy infantry and tanks. "In the course of the fighting the enemy sustained huge losses in manpower and equipment.

"Troops of the Byelo-Russian Sector, as a result of a vigorous offensive by our advanced units and infantry forces on the night of November 17-18, after three days' fierce engagements, captured the town of Rechitsa.

"Continuing their offensive, the troops of this sector captured more than 30 populated places, including Vasilivichi, district center. They also captured the large populated places of Ballaehvka, Gavonovichi, Budhaeshibenka, Staroye-Kraevnoye, Novoye-Krasnoye, Vasilkovo and Golobki.

JUGOSLAVS MEET CHINESE ADMIT 2-WAY ATTACKS NEW JAP GAINS

LONDON, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Jugoslav Partisans were battling heavily reinforced German and native forces in widely scattered areas, scoring successes in Serbia and Herzegovina, but falling back before steady enemy pressure in Dalmatia, a communique broadcast by the Yugoslav Liberation Army reported today.

Severe losses were inflicted on the Nazis and Chetniks on the Bosnia-Serbian border near Sijemce, more than 100 enemy dead being counted in fighting which still continues, the bulletin said. Other German attacks were repulsed at Dragovac, near Smedrova, the report added.

Three Dalmatian Towns Lost Reinforced German forces on the Dalmatian coast blasted the Pag, Makro Ostrovo and Veliki Drvenik in their drive to clear the coastal regions, although they were checked in several other thrusts. Gen. Josip Broz' (Tito's) Jugoslavs faced a new threat in the northwestern provinces of Slovenia and Croatia, where the Germans were reported concentrating large forces around Ptuj, Susak, Krkvenca and Kraljevica, with the evident intention of launching a full-dress offensive.

Still Hold Peninsula Partisan troops, contrary to reports in Tuesday's communique, have not evacuated the Peljesac Peninsula at the southern end of the Dalmatian coast, today's bulletin said. The Jugoslavs admitted abandoning part of the peninsula, but assert they still are entrenched firmly in the remaining portion of the strategic bridgehead.

3 Flyers on Icy Rock Saved By Last Signal Shot MONTREAL, Nov. 19.—(AP)—Rescued after being marooned on a gale-swept rock off Greenland for ten days, three Royal Air Force officers—two American—told how their last signal flare, sighted by a United States Army officer on board a small steamer en route to Greenland, saved them from death by starvation and exposure.

The three airmen, recuperating here, are Capt. Robert E. Coffman, 32 years old, of Baton Rouge, La., pilot; Flying Officer Norman E. Greenway, 23, of Camrose, Alta., navigator, and Radio Officer Ronald E. Snow, 22, of Digby, N. S. They agreed they had "come back from the dead" to tell about their adventure.

Forced to take to their rubber dinghy when their Hampden trainer crashed in the Atlantic, they landed on the barren rock after rowing 20 hours through ice-choked seas. Shelter cliffs on the Greenland coast made landing there impossible, they said.

The Hampden, one of a flight being ferried from England to British Columbia, was forced down by motor trouble. Emergency rations of malted milk tablets, a little chocolate and three pints of water, supplemented by melted snow, were all but exhausted when the crew of the rescue vessel carried them aboard.

Engine trouble on the steamer, which caused it to halt eight miles off Greenland's coast, was instrumental in their rescue. Maj. John T. Crowell of Isle Haut, Me., gazing shoreward, sighted the glint of a holo mirror and the glare of Coffman's last very-pistol cartridge.

Allied Java Raid Hinted

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—(AP)—A Tokyo broadcast recorded today by United States government monitors said Allied bombers had appeared over the eastern end of Java and the nearby island of Bali yesterday but had been driven off by Japanese anti-aircraft fire and naval air units.
