## 6619 COLONY CITIZENS CAST VOTES

### BEETS WORKERS RETURNING

Sugar beet workers are returning to this project in increasing numbers. Some 200 volunteer laborers, who have finished harvesting crops in different sections of Oregon, Montana and Idaho have already returned. It is expected that over 90 per cent of the some 700 local evacuees, who answered the call of desparate labor ridden sugar companies, will return here within the next few days.

Howard Imazeki, editor in chief of the DISPATCH, who returned from a three week labor stretch Sunday night around the Caldwell, Idaho area, reported that "he was only too glad to be back home." Imazeki, who stressed that beet work was breaking, failed to accumulate a fortune. The vagabonding DISPATCH chief, stated that living conditions around the Caldwell region were satisfactory. However, he added that conditions in Payette County were poor.

"All in all, it was a great experience," Imazeki summed up.

Among other arrivals returning Sunday night were George "Goetz" Yamaguchi and Tosh Taniguchi and his new bride, the former Lois Tanabe, whom he married in the Minidoka project.

# COLONY HIGHER EDUCATION COURSES OFFER COLLEGE CREDITS

College credit courses to be offered by the Higher Education department have been released for public information. English, European and American history, mathematics from algebra through differential calculus, zoology, physics, botany, psychology, economics, political science, philosophy, sociology, jurisprudence, art, music, hygiene, German, public speaking and home economic are tentatively offered.

Registrar May Sato emphasizes that unless enough students sign up for any one class,

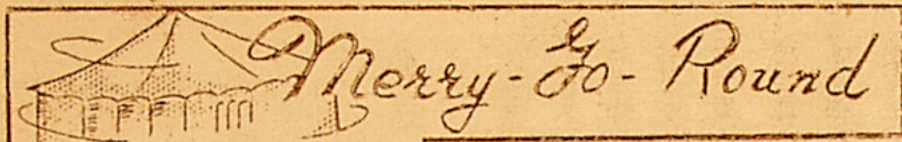
the department will be unable to sponsor that class. All classes mentioned are open for pre-registration and the choice of subjects to be taught will depend on the popularity of the classes under consideration.

Miss Sato further said that at present the higher education group will operate at #3108. The building will house the registrar's office, library and classrooms. Although starting with limited facilities, the school is expected to expand in accordance with utilization of the opportunities offered the Co-

lonists interested in higher education.

Most of the courses offered will receive full credit from the Sacramento Junior College and the University of California extension division. Class meetings will be held every week night, frequency depending on the number of units desired.

More than 100 prospective students have already signed up. Registration hours are 8 a.m. to 12 noon and 1:15 to 5:15 p. m. from Monday through Friday of this week. Offices will also be open from 7 to 8 p.m. from Wednesday to Friday.
