True leadership from now on must come from those who are strong and brave, mentally and emotionally, and have an uncompromising attitude toward the stability of the nisei in America at heart.

FIRST WORLD WAR VET, TANIGAWA, ENLISTS AGAIN

Age and physical disability did not deter John Tanigawa, World War I veteran, from enlisting for the second time in the present conflict.

Tanigawa, who is 40 years old having a wife and four children in the Colony, applied for enlistment in the U.S. Army Language School with the rest of the young men.

Physical examination revealed that his teeth was not up to army standard. Because of his veteran status, he was allowed to enlist provided that he get dental treatment. He will leave for Savage, Minn., later.

Tanigawa, a Hawaiian born nisei, enlisted in the first World War right after its outbreak and served as a machine gunner for two years.

He took part in such famous battles as Meuse, Argonne, and Chateau Thierry. He was recently nominated as a candidate for the City Council from Ward 2. He may have to withdraw since no enlisted man can run for any civil office.

Son of another World War veteran also enlisted. He is Edwin Fukui, young son of Shuichi Fukui, a Japanese translator on The Tulean Dispatch.

NEW COUNCILMEN TO BE HONORED AT INSTALLATION RITES TUESDAY

Tule Lake's first official City Council will be sworn into office tomorrow evening in an installation ceremony at #2320 from 8 p.m.

As provided for in newly-adopted constitution, 28 persons; or four persons representing each ward, will form the legislative body for the community. Election will be held today throughout the Project.

The program for the evening will open with the presentation of the colors by the Boy Scouts, then the pledge of allegiance to the flag followed by singing of the National Anthem.

The present chairman of the judicial committee will give the oath of office to the incoming councilmen. New council officials will also be elected.

Short talks will be given by the new chairman of the council; Gerry Wakayama, temporary council chairman; and Elmer Shirrell, project director.
