UNIT ORGANIZED TO SPEED CLOTHING MONEY PAYMENT

Monthly clothing allowances will be paid by check rather than by scrip, according to E.R. Fryer, regional WRA director.

The clothing unit has been organized and payments will be made in the near future at this Project. If any errors have been made in the payment of clothing allowances, adjustments should be made at 801-D, after payments have been completed. This is to facilitate payment.

Employees in the clothing unit are working 56 hours a week in order to speed the payment of clothing allowances and it is requested that they not be disturbed by interruptions until the payments have been made.

These allowances have been made effective as of last July 1, and the first payments will cover July, August, September, and Oct. 1, Mr. Fryer said. Accounting procedure will be set up at each Project to compute the amounts due.

Employed evacuees, or those who are eligible for unemployment compensation, will receive the cash allowance for himself and for each dependent who is not employed or not receiving unemployment compensation.

60% OF MONTHLY PAY GIVEN AS UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION

Plans are underway for the payment of compensation to the Project's unemployed. According to Frank C. Smith, housing and employment officer, compensation will be paid evacuees who have been registered for work at least 15 days and who have not been offered employment.

The 15-day period shall run from the time of the original registration for work, or from the date of termination of a job, or from Oct. 1, 1942, whichever is later.

60% OF MONTHLY PAY

Unemployment compensation is intended to cover minimum essentials for the individual and his dependents. It shall be at the rate of 60% of the primary classification for which the applicant is registered for work; i.e., \$7.20, \$9.60, or \$11.40 per month.

Unemployment compensation shall be paid only after application to and certification by the employment division. Applications for unemployment benefits should be made without delay to Placement Office, #1208.

INELIGIBLE REASONS

Those ineligible for

unemployment compensation are those who have refused to accept suitable employment; those who have been discharged for cause, and, after hearing by the Fair Employment Practice Committee and whose recommendation believes that the grounds for discharge were reasonable; those who have been certified as unqualified by the Employment Bureau because of physical incapacity; those whom the Welfare Section find unqualified because of family situations.

HIRABAYASHI EVACUATION TRIAL IS LIKENED TO DRED SCOTT CASE

The Gordon Hirabayashi case is one of the most interesting cases in American History and may stand in importance with the Dred-Scott case, stated Mary Farquason, state senator in Washington and wife of a University of Washington professor, in a recent visit to the Project.

Hirabayashi, a U of W student, is testing the legality of the evacuation and is backed by a volunteer committee and the American Friends Service Society.

The chief test of the

case is whether constitutional rights can be put aside so easily, Farquason told the Student Christian Association group, and whether in war, the constitution still stands.

The case was dismissed from the district courts and the committee working on the case attempting to carry it to the circuit courts of appeal.

ployment compensation. If anyone in the family, in addition to the family head, is also employed, the cash allowance will be made direct to the worker and not to the family head. Employable individuals who have not accepted offers of work are not eligible.

The monthly allowance at the Tule Lake Project will be \$3.75 for each person 16 years of age or over, \$3.25 for persons from 8 to 16 years of age, and \$2.25 for persons under 8 years of age.

No deduction will be made from these cash allowances for any surplus army clothing issued either to workers or non-workers previous to Oct. 21.

ESTIMATED 8000 CAST VOTES IN MONDAY'S CITY ELECTION

With eligible citizens of the City X-ing four candidates on approximately 8,000 individual ballots were cast in Monday's project wide election of four ward representatives to the permanent City council under the newly ratified City charter, it was disclosed today after a final re-check.

The closest race of the day resulted in the Ward III race where the first three top men were separated by a scant five votes. Roy Miura, block 26 nominee, took honors of the election by polling a grand 1085 votes.

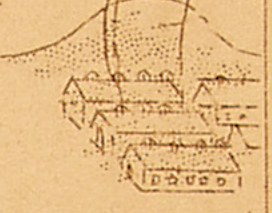
