CANTEENS ADVISE HOLIDAY CANDIES WILL BE SCARCE

Every effort is being made, it was announced today by the Cooperative Enterprises Inc, to obtain as much candy as possible to satisfy the Colonists need for the holiday season.

Many orders have been cancelled or reduced at the sources contacted, it was added and it will be impossible to obtain candy in sufficient quantity.

It is advised by the Cooperatives that all persons depending on the canteens should place their orders elsewhere wherever possible to supply their candy wants it was pointed out.

ABBOTT: NISEI FUTURE IN CO-OP REALM GOOD

"There is a big future in employment and owning of factories and businesses by the nisei in the cooperative realm." So declared Parker Abbott, manager of Associated Cooperatives in Northern California, in an address before the local co-op (Cont'd on page 3 Col. 1)

To keep complete record in order that each purchaser may receive due credit for their purchase, scrip buyers are asked to bring their W.C.C.A. family number and their addresses.

Scrip sale record, it was announced, will serve not only as a basis upon which patronage dividends can be declared, but it will make the payment of income tax unnecessary. Cash purchase, however, will be subject to tax and patronage dividends cannot be declared on such sales since scrips are the only means by which records of individual purchases of co-op members can be kept.

Savings in income tax made possible by scrip sales will be of great thrift value to the colonist, it was stated.

COOP:

COMMON SENSE

A series of questions and answers regarding the cooperative operation of the community enterprises will be released by the co-op office. The following is the first of this series.

1. What benefits do I get from becoming a member? Ans. Among many benefits from membership are: return of patronage dividends, a gift of interest bearing certificate, and the right to participate in Co-op activities.

2. Do I have to pay \$1 to become a member? Ans. Yes.

3. How can I be sure that the co-op is worth investing \$1 to become a member? Ans. See the last Profit and Loss statement. Your Block representative will explain the details to you.

4. Is it possible for one person to hold more than one membership? Ans. No.

5. Can I sell my membership to someone else if I wish? Ans. No.

6. If I wish to withdraw, will membership fee be refunded? Ans. No.

7. If I leave the Project, will my membership fee be refunded? Ans. Yes.

8. Can non-members buy at the stores too? Ans. Yes

9. Can the canteen employees hold membership in the co-op? Ans. Yes.

10. Through what channel will the questions and complaints of the members be taken care of? Ans. This will be taken care of by the membership committee. A complaint box may be placed at every canteen in which a member may deposit his complaint. Then, the proper party will investigate the complaint.

Abbott told the group that the relocation of Japanese in WRA centers offered an ideal set-up for cooperatives. He intimated that out of the tragedy of the evacuation great good would possibly arise through the cooperative channels.

"Cooperatives are inherently decent. They work towards the realization of peace and keeping peace," Abbott continued. "They offer the individual dignity and freedom."

Abbott stated that he has proposed to the national headquarters in Chicago for a plan whereby an expert buyer from each relocation center may be officed in Reno, Nevada.
