RALPH KUETTEL, RADIO PIANIST IN BENEFIT CONCERT MONDAY

Ralph Kuettel, staff pianist for station K.M.J. Fresno, California, N.E.C. network, is expected to arrive in the Project Monday, Dec. 14, to give a benefit concert at #25-08, starting at 8 p.m. sharp.

TWENTY BOILERS NEED REPAIRS

Inability to secure replacement parts has compelled 20 hot water boilers to remain temporarily out of commission. This represents an approximated six percent of the Colony's total inventory of boilers, it was announced by the Maintenance division.

Wartime red tape and security of materials has accounted for the delay in obtaining the needed parts.

Much diligence should be exercised by the operators to prevent further break downs of essential equipment, Maintenance division officials indicated.

At least one faucet in each pipe system should be allowed to run throughout the night, to prevent freezing of piping.

TWO THOUSAND TOYS GIVEN COLONY BY CHURCHES

More than 2,000 toys have been donated by various churches and organizations throughout the United States to the Tule Lake Union Church, Girl Reserves, Sacramento Y.W. C.A., and the Boy Scouts to be distributed among the younger children in the Project.

Included among the toys are mechanical toys, model airplanes, old records, dolls, books, games, puzzles, baseballs, wagons, footballs, etc.

These toys have been coming in for the past three weeks and are still coming in. Although practically all the toys are

new, a few are discards. Both the Boy Scouts and the Girl Reserves have volunteered to repair these discarded toys.

The Christmas toy committee under the Recreation department is handling the toys distribution. The committee includes Mitsuru Nishio, Mas Jinguji, Eureka Satow, Yuki Takata, and Elaine Ishikawa.

CITY DIRECTORY NEARS COMPLETION FOR ALPHABETIZING PROCEDURES

With virtually all block listing in, the City Directory is almost for complete alphabetizing. Only half of division personnel lists have been submitted. In order to facilitate the compilation of the publication, all division chiefs who have not handed in the list of responsible heads and foremen with their titles are asked to do so at once.

Contacts for low bids have been made with several printing firms and estimates are expected to come in. According to first calculations, residents purchasing the directory will be getting approximately 50 cents

worth of publication for the tentatively set price of 15 cents.

MANZANAR

"WITH FIRMINess IN THE RIGHT AS GOD GIVES US TO SEE THE RIGHT..."

When the last wisp of smoke had cleared away from a "Pearl Harbor Banzai" demonstration of pro-Japanese nationals at Manzanar last week, eyes of the world witnessed a spectacle that would have made Japanese militarists shudder in their boots.

A group of nisei Boy Scouts defended the American flag armed with stones in front of the center's administration office against a surging fanatical mob.

Stupid and irresponsible as the affair was, nisei population of Manzanar -- reflecting all the loyal Japanese Americans throughout the country -- have won a new place in American democracy in deeds and action.

Forcing one group's wishes upon another is unadulterated fascism and nisei have time and time again deplored and resisted such methods.

We recognize that it was a minority who perpetrated the colossal disgrace suffered by not only the residents of
