"WITH FIRMESS IN THE RI-CHT AS GOD GIVES US TO SEE THE RIGHT .. "

When the last wisp of snoke had cleared away from a "Peacl Harbor Banzai" demonstration of pro-Japanese nalionals at Manzanar last week, eyes of the world witnessed a spectacle that would have made Japanese militarists shudder in their boots.

A group of nisei Boy Scouts defended the American flag armed with stones in front of the center's administration office against a surging fanatical mob.

Stupid and irresponsible as the affair was, nisei population of Manzanar -- reflecting all the loyal Japanese Americans throughout the country -- have won a new place in American democracy in deeds and action.


