WASHINGTON -- The Department of Agriculture said today it has increased deliveries of foodstuffs for the Allied Nations in October by 93 million pounds ever the preceding month, depositing at shipside some 645,000,000 pounds.

The Agricultural Marketing Administration delivery report shows incroased delivories of eggs, dairy products, meats, grains, and other products.

Lend-lease ogg shipments to the Allies are at the rate of about 15 percent of tetal American priduction.

The largest delivery of butter to date was made during Octubor,

5,036,520 pounds. As in proceding months, cheese and dry skim milk were delivered in heavier volume than any other dairy products.

The need for concentrated foods also reflected in heavier deliveries of dehydrated vegetables, concentrated citrus juice and dried fruits.

Conned pork for Russian and British destinations composed the bulk of moat deliveries in recent months. The October total of meats for all United Nations was about 93,157,000 pounds.
