645 MILLION POUNDS OF FOOD HELP ALLIES

WASHINGTON--The Department of Agriculture said today it has increased deliveries of foodstuffs for the Allied Nations in October by 93 million pounds over the preceding month, depositing at shipside some 645,000,000 pounds.

The Agricultural Marketing Administration delivery report shows increased deliveries of eggs, dairy products, meats, grains, and other products.

Lend-lease egg shipments to the Allies are at the rate of about 15 percent of total American production.

The largest delivery of butter to date was made during October,

5,036,520 pounds. As in preceding months, cheese and dry skim milk were delivered in heavier volume than any other dairy products.

The need for concentrated foods also reflected in heavier deliveries of dehydrated vegetables, concentrated citrus juice and dried fruits.

Canned pork for Russian and British destinations composed the bulk of meat deliveries in recent months. The October total of meats for all United Nations was about 93,157,000 pounds.

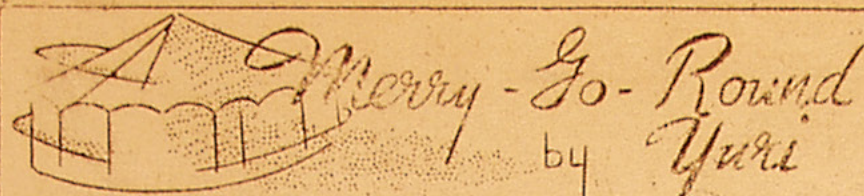

Director Shirrell, who is leaving the Project shortly for the Middle-west in the service of the War Relocation Authority, expressed deep appreciation for the honor accorded him and declared that the time spent in this Colony from its inception in April has been "one of the most happiest moments of my life."

"It has been a great responsibility on my shoulder", the director continued, "to recreate 15,000 human beings out of the frustrated and broken life they had to undergo because of the evacuation. But with your help, we have been able to accomplish a lot toward the final goal we are aiming at."

Persons with work leaves may apply for leave clearance with Employment Investigator.
