PERMISSION ASKED FOR SOLDIER VISITS HERE

The Japanese Parents' Club of American Soldiers here, whose 400 sons are now serving in the U.S. Army, sent a letter Saturday to Lt. Gen. John L. DeWitt, Commanding General of the Western Defense Command and the Fourth Army, requesting permission to have nisei soldiers visit their parents here.

"We have been receiving letters recently from our sons," the letter said in part, "saying that due to Army regulations emanating from your command, they have been prohibited from visiting us here in the Tule Lake Relocation Project.

"Since this may be our last opportunity to see our sons alive, we earnestly beg of you to grant permission to our sons to visit us at this Project."

The letter was signed by George Sakai, president of the club, and Mr. Seto, secretary.

The club was organized recently in the City for social and fraternal benefits.

CHRISTMAS EVE IN CITY BLACKED OUT

Christmas Eve was ushered in at Tule Lake with a series of electric blackouts. At 7:55 p.m. electric service was cut off to one fourth of the Colony. The remainder of the settlement was subjected to darkness at 9:35 p.m. The complete restoration of electricity came about 11 p.m.

General confusion prevailed at various Eve functions, due to the current-stoppage. Three of the private dances were temporarily curtailed because of their sole dependency on P.A. systems for music. However, lanterns and candles were brought in and songfests and other activities kept the parties cheerful until the lights went on.

CO-OP DRIVE MEMBERSHIP OVER 5000 INDICATED

With the Co-op membership considerably over the 5,000 mark, the sales of scrip books are increasing day by day. The members making use of scrip are availing themselves of the following advantages:

1. Making possible the patronage record from which dividends will be declared in accordance with the By-Laws.

2. Saving Income Tax (State sale tax must be paid). (Non-membership or cash purchases are subject to income tax of about 60 percent of the profit. This profit can and should be saved by the residence for their own use by being members and using scrip.)

3. Benefiting from and enhancing economical buying. (You are contributing to enhance the vast purchasing power of the Co-op. The Co-op being a member of the Associated Cooperative Wholesale of Northern California which is affiliated with the national movement.)

NEW OFFICE WING OPENED REPORTED

An ambulance cruising near Block #19 directly opposite the scene of the mishap was available for immediate service.

Extent of injuries sustained by Yoshikawa are: a compound fractured left thigh and minor internal injuries. He is expected to survive.

This marks the Colony's first serious traffic accident officials stated.

Yoshikawa became 22 years old on the day of the accident.

ENTERPRISES SAYS NO REFUND ON PURCHASES

Due to the fact that consumer purchases can be measured only by the purchase of scrips, it was reported it will be impractical to make refunds for merchandise purchased in any of the enterprises.

A clerk who is requested to make a refund has no way of knowing whether the merchandise was purchased with scrip or cash it was added.

If such merchandise was purchased with scrips it will be possible for the purchaser to use the money refunded to rebuy another scrip. This will double the amount of his patronage record without any additional outlay of cash.

However, merchandises will be gladly exchanged at any time in any department within the same store.

CO-OP BOOKS SHOWS BUSINESS IN ORDER

Mr. Walter Jacobson, certified public accountant representing the Northwest Cooperative Auditing Service Association of Walla Walla, Washington stated at the Board of Directors meeting Monday night that he and Mr. Albert Jentsch found all of the Co-op books and records in order.

He also stated that all information was readily available; and that he was satisfied that the business was carried on according to proper procedure.

The complete audit report will be forth coming in the near future based upon discussion and suggestion by the Board of Directors and other departmental groups.

REGISTRATIONS ON BIRTH DATE

During the continuance of the present war, those who were born on or after January 1, 1925, shall be registered for the selective service draft on the day they become 18.

If their birthday falls on a Sunday or a legal holiday, it was announced their registration shall take place on the following day that is not a Sunday or a legal holiday.

It is stressed again that 18 year old boys should take notice and register on the days as stated above, it was added by the Legal Aid department.
