## NEW RULES FOR STUDENTS

New instructions in connection with regulations for student relocation have arrived from Washington, it was revealed.

Students who are applying for the first time and those who have not filled out any forms will be required to fill out WRA Forms 126 and 130, which, with copies of the Student Relocation questionnaires, will be available at the Social Welfare office, #1608-C.

Applicants will first fill out forms 126 and 130, take them to Mrs. Alice Hasegawa at the Placement office, #1203. After interviewing them, she will obtain for the applicants form 126. Mrs. Hasegawa will see that these forms are processed in San Francisco and Washington.

Those wishing counsel may go to the Social Welfare office on Saturday afternoons at 1:15, at which time several counselors will be there to advise the students.

## "AMERICA IS WORTH FIGHTING, DYING FOR—" RESETTLER WRITES

How does one feel when he is relocated on the outside? Here's a letter from B. H. who recently went out of Tule Lake to Worland, Wyo., for a permanent job.

"This is one of the great breaks of my life," the letter said, "and it feels great to live and work in the American way of life again. One never knows how great the American society is unless he meets the people on the outside today.

"To be set free from Camp one realizes more and more that America is

worth fighting and dying for. One also realizes that we have a war to win and that petty complaints in Camp need to be forgotten because all America is fighting an all-out war.

"For loyal nisei I strongly urge them to get out of Camp...The feeling of being an integral part of this American Nation is something you people in Camp do not fully realize.

"Thank you, and God speed relocation efforts."

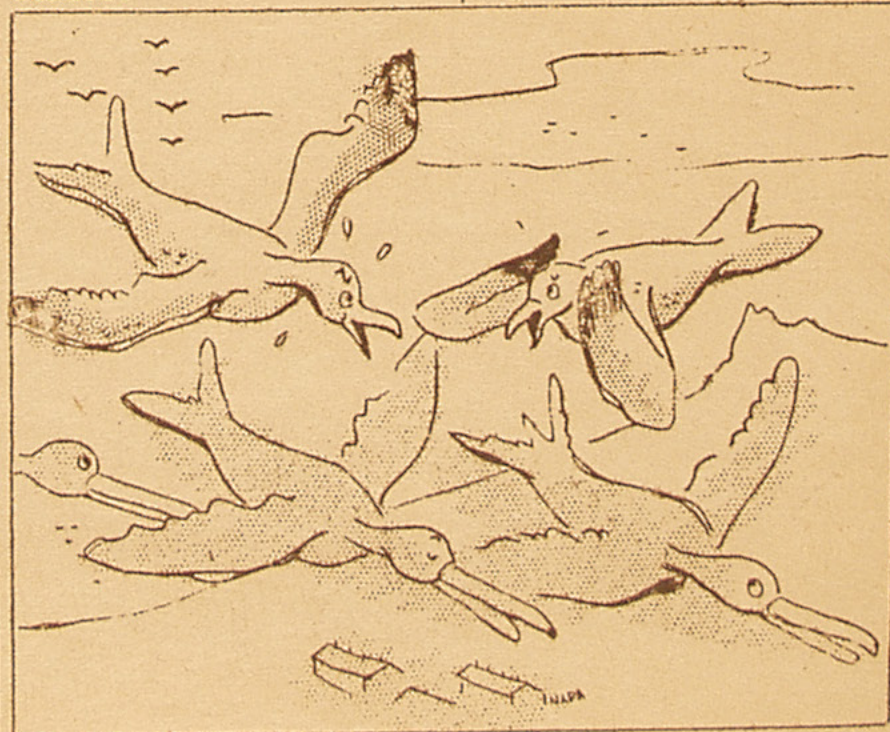
the Co-op on all mail order purchases placed through the Co-op (your scrip books are good for these orders).

Yosh Negi, sharp-shooting Marysville guard, was high point man with 6.

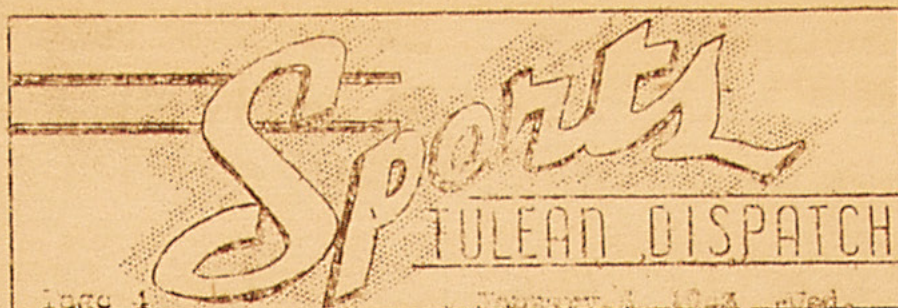
## AMERICAN LEAGUE RACE FINALLY SHOWS LIFE
