JUDICIAL PANEL NAMED

PLAN LECTURE SERIES DESIGNED TO ACQUAINT PARENTS ON DELINQUENCY

Designed to acquaint the parents on juvenile problems, a series of lectures by persons versed in such problems is being planned by the Joint Juvenile Delinquency Committee.

A trial lecture is tentatively slated to be held in Ward I on Jan. 13 in connection with regular Ward meeting.

The committee is also

anticipating to form a consulting board with various civic leaders and persons acquainted with juvenile problems.

The Joint Juvenile Delinquency Committee is composed of members from the City Council, Planning Board, schools, recreation departments, wardens, youth organizations, and churches.

With the jurisdiction to try all offenses less than a felony as defined by the Penal Code of the State of California, 61 Judicial Commissioners have been selected to hear such cases in this Project.

At each hearing, 12 members will be present in accordance with the City Charter. The executive secretary of the council will be the clerk of the body.

A mock trial is slated to be held within a few days to acquaint the new jurors with their duties.

JAPANESE FORCES HAVING TOUGH TIME IN SUBJUGATION OF PHILIPPINES....

TOKYO, (Dec. 5, O.W.I. Radio Monitor) relayed by Harbin, tells home and Empire audiences in Japanese, relating a report from a naval correspondent aboard a Japanese warship: "It is known that natives in the Luzon area will not submit and the Imperial Forces have been taking a lenient attitude awaiting their voluntary submission but ...the natives are continuing resistance. At the time of the outbreak of the war, there was a considerable number of enemy troops in the area. A greater part of them surrendered to the Japanese forces but the remaining number fled into the hills continuing resistance against Japanese forces and menacing the natives of that area.

STRENGTH NOT GREAT--

"Of course the strength of the enemy is not great with just machine guns and rifles. It is said that only about half of them are armed and those without arms are serving the units as

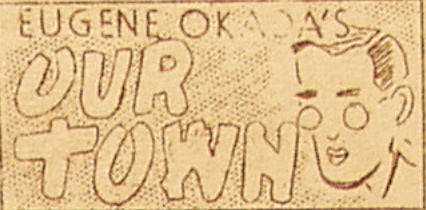
lookouts. The situation is such that whenever the Japanese forces appear they warn their units and flee into the hills. It is also reported that even if the Japanese forces go forward to meet the enemy they would hide themselves and the expedition would end almost uselessly.

MARINE HANDINGS--

"Our naval units since October 24 have crossed to the numerous islands, giving aid to the land forces and shutting off the enemy supply routes. By landing marine units, attacks were carried out in the regions infested by the enemy.

COMMUNICATION LINES--

"Since the start of punitive operations our Marine units destroyed six telegraphic communication posts and over 60 boats were set afire. The communication and supply lines have been gradually reduced. It is believed that it will not be long before the remnant enemy forces are completely annihilated."

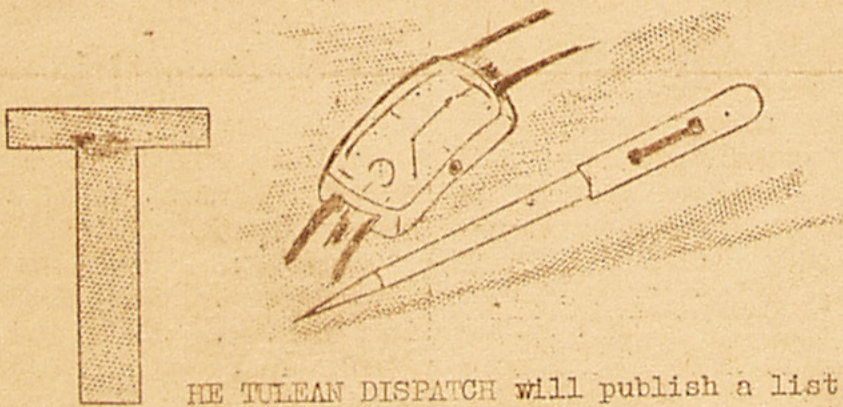

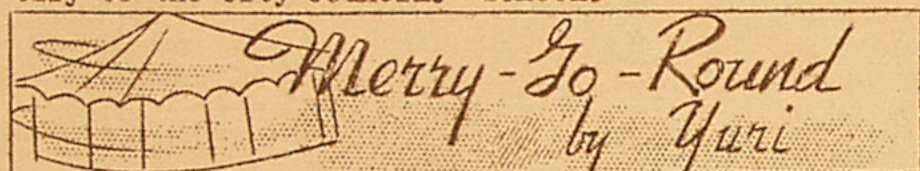
63 BLACK SHAWLS MADE FOR R. CROSS

PLANNING BOARD ON ATTENDANCE

As a result of the study conducted by the research department of the Planning Board the daily attendance average of the public schools in Tule Lake War Relocation Project was found to be higher than the average for outside schools.

There have been rumors in this colony that a high percentage of absence was existing in the schools and that this was because parents were neglecting their children's education through indifference or because of lack of warm clothing for their children of school ages.

The daily non-attendances of outside schools has been computed at an excess of 5% while that of the colony schools has been found to be less than 5%.

MA'S WANTED

WANTED: Instructors for college extension courses. Usual qualification is a Master's degree. Interested persons contact May Sato at the high school.

Possible factors causing non attendance are summarized as follows:

1. Conditions in the homes.
2. The minimum ages for compulsory attendance of public schools are different according to the laws of Washington and California.
3. Inadequate supply of equipment in various departments of the schools.
4. Insufficient ability and training of assistant instructors to teach high school courses.
5. Illness.
6. Inclement weather.
7. Lack of transportation during severe climatic conditions.
8. Lack of warm clothing for school students.
9. Inadequate and cold school-lunches for students.
10. Improper ventilation of school rooms.

Same abnormal cases of a high percentage of absences have occurred as when 900 students were absent from high school on one particular day in November, when there was snow and cold wind creating a mild blizzard, and when epidemics of communicable disease and colds have been prevalent.

Parents are advised to better acquaint themselves with their children's work and general conditions in the schools through personal contacts with teachers.
