WILL ISSUE UNIFORMS TO 2 CREWS

The issuance of uniforms to wardens and mess workers and shoes to the members of the Fire department has been approved by Washington and will be distributed to the respective divisions within the next few days, it was announced by the administration.

It must be understood that these uniforms do not constitute a gift nor do they set a precedent. This issue of clothing is the result of negotiations recently concluded for the disposal of uniforms which were ordered prior to Oct. 21, 1942, when the Project received a new statement of policy regarding the issuance of same. This will be the first and probably the only clothing of this kind to be distributed on the Project. No additional uniforms of this type for this or other personnel can or will be purchased.

These uniforms will remain the property of the Division and not the property of the wearer. In the event that a worker is terminated from his position clothing will revert back to the department.

Uniforms shall be worn only on duty. Violators of this provision will be required to pay for the uniforms.

WARDEN'S UNIFORM

Official uniforms were issued to the WRA wardens last week in accordance with the WRA policy of providing uniforms through the departments.

The wardens are now attired in tan gabardine windbreaker jackets, black ties and navy blue serge trousers.

ACUTE COAL SITUATION REVEALED

A serious coal situation has again arisen and unless immediate action is taken to unload the 40 carloads now sitting on the tracks, other parties may take them away, Joe Hayes, assistant project director, told the City Council at a special meeting last week-end.

It was pointed out that unless these idle freight cars are unloaded, the present emergency necessitates that they be taken to some other point where the coal would be unloaded.

In an effort to solve this problem, a call has been issued for 200 workers as the present crew is too small.

The Council has moved that if enough persons do not apply for this work, a volunteer system would be established as this vital shipment of coal would be lost to the Colony unless immediate action is taken.

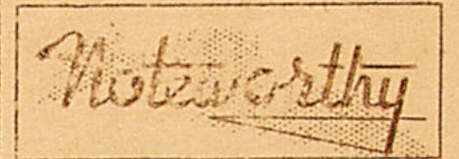
APPLY FOR LEAVE CLEARANCE

MIKS BEAT WAKS 39-26 IN USUAL WILD GAME

The traditional Miks-Wakaba casaba battle didn't disappoint the 1,500 fans who crammed around the Block 35 court last Sunday as far as high-class action and spirited play were concerned, but the 39-26 Mik triumph was more of a margin than most do poststars anticipated.

Playing facilities were ideal and the game was the finest seen to date. Not a fan left the scene of action until the final whistle had blown.

As for the action, in the first minutes of the first half, the Miks jumped to a 5-0 lead on 2 field goals and a foul shot before Shig Takuma broke the ice for the Waks with a lay-in and Andy Sugiyama followed with a rebound to close the gap to 5-4.

From then on the Waks tied the score and went ahead until the last few minutes of the opening period.

Then with the Wakabas leading 13-12, player-coach Mas Hara dumped in two quick ones to give the Mikados a 16-13 lead and the half ended a minute later with the Miks in front 18 to 15.

Waks' Bob Hayashida opened the second half with a one handed push shot from the side to make the score 18-17, and that was as close as the Wakabas came to overcoming the high-flying Miks for the rest of the game.
