COAL PROBLEM SOLVED BY 450 VOLUNTEERS

The emergency coal crisis reached the turning point today, with the final 38 carloads of coal expected to be unloaded by tonight, Noboru Shirai, executive secretary of the City Council, revealed today.

During the past three days, a crew of 450 volunteers cleared 118 carloads. On Wednesday, 42 freight cars were unloaded, while 38 were unloaded Thursday and the same number today.

Only 15 cars were diverted, before the volunteer crew took action to save the coal for the co-

INAEMOTE DETONDORMED.

PROBLEM IS WORLD-WIDE IN WAR. NEED CLOSER TIES WITH SCHOOL

In New York City today Mayor LaGuardia seems to be in a hot spot with school authorities and various Wolfare organizations hopping all over his mayorality office demanding that Him Honor does something about the "sudden outburst" of juvenile delinquency.

The situation as it exists in New York City may not be so serious as it is implied in news reports emanating from our eastern metropolis. But it seems certain that the war and all it does to human psychology -- especially to our plastic youths -- has greatly increased the problems of juvenile conduct all over the country, and all over the world.

So, it is not peculiar or particularly disconsolating to find a number of cases of juvenile delinquency among our young evacuees in Tule Lake. We must attact this problem scientifically and with warm human understanding.

The City Council and the Planning Board are on the right road, we believe, when they made several proposals to combat juvenile problems here this week. The one in particular was their strong recommendation to form a group patterned after the Parents-Teachers Association.

We are grateful for the fine work our teachers are doing for our youngstors. But, that is not encugh! We, as parents of these children, must evince our deep interest in their welfare and see that they will be well prepared, mentally and emotionally, to meet the world on their two feet as world citizens when the war is over.

We must instill in them the moral sense of human decency, duty, and responsibility. They need our sympathetic understanding and guidance. duty as parents to show the way of the world.
