

## WORK TROUBLES HEARD BY FAIR PRACTICE BOARD

Due to various complaints that have been coming into the Fair Practice Committee, Masao Kawada, chairman of the committee, cites Administration Instruction #27, issued on Sept. 1, 1942. In Section 4, Paragraph D, the following is written:

"Any evacuee employee may report in writing any employment complaint to the Fair Practice Committee or to any of its members. The Fair Practice Chairman shall investigate and by consultations with the parties concerned seek to effect a satisfactory solution."

"If such solution is not promptly secured he shall present the case to a meeting of the Fair Practice Committee, which shall arrive at an opinion on the validity of the complaint and shall authorize the Fair Practice chairman to prepare a written statement of the case."

"This statement shall be prepared by the Fair Practice to the project employment office for his action. Appeal may be taken from the attention of the Employment Officer to the Project Director, whose decision shall be final."

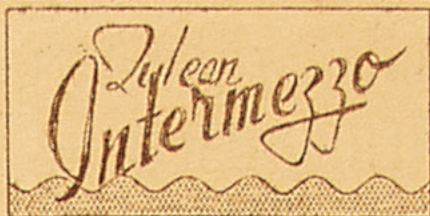

# CITY FATHERS HEAR SCHOOL PROBLEMS

Reports from the school authorities on youth problems at the schools, and reports from a committee regarding religious ministers on the WRA payroll, and committee reports on recreational facilities were heard at the City Council meeting held Wednesday afternoon at #1308.

Kenneth M. Harkness, Martin P. Gunderson and A. G. Walker gave a brief report on the school situation.

## LOW DELINQUENCY

In comparison with the schools outside, they stated, the juvenile delinquency problem in the Project school is quite low. The problem, however, will become greater yearly. In cooperation with other groups, the school authorities are studying means of improving the school situation.

Some of the points touched upon were, organization of a P.T.A. supervised study for students, in the block mess halls, establishment of ordinances.

## MINISTERS' PAY

The committee investigating into the possibility of having ministers on WRA payroll reported that consensus among the ministers indicated that they would rather work for the church, and that offerings were sufficient monetary compensation.

The Council voted to accept titles to equipments purchased by the recreational department, so that the equipments would stay in the hands of the colonists.

Within the next few days, the city library will open a Boy Scouts corner with over 400 books and pamphlets to the public.

Among the activities outlined by the scouts are ping pong tournament, indoor scout meet, and presentation of charters to troops when R. S. Igarashi, scout executive, and other Council members arrive from Klamath Falls.

The Boy Scouts volunteered for tray services to sick persons in Block 9 while plans were still being made by the hospital and social welfare departments.

# SPORTS HONOR CLUB PROBABLE

A sports honorary society is also a possibility to come out of the athletic association which will be formed here soon.

Although the plans are still indefinite, the following ideas will probably be used in the formation of the society.

1. The city will be considered somewhat like a school and anyone competing in the various sports will be eligible for the society.

2. To become a member of the society, a player must be awarded the honorary emblem or letter which will be put up by the athletic association.

3. The first selection for the honor club will be made by the teams themselves. They will have the opportunity to pick one player whom they think is outstanding on

their team and should be awarded the emblem.

4. Then all of the team choices will be considered by a group, most likely the Rec Sports Dept.

5. Those eligible for the award will be graded on leadership, sportsmanship, value to the team, playing ability, etc.

6. Out of all of the team selections, only a few (number to be decided by the association) will receive the honorary ward and the right to be a member of the sports honorary society.

7. The player who receives the award will have the right to wear the emblem and it is possible that the club may also have a lettermen's sweater, stripes and all.

There are many points which need to be ironed out and changes or additions made, but the above are the general plans to date. Further changes will be made when the athletic association begins to function.
