COURSES IN PSYCHOLOGY,
 STATISTICS WILL BE OFFERED

With the approval for psychology (1 a) and elementary statistics (economic 40) sanctioned from San Francisco, these courses in the college extension division will get underway in February.

Enrollment for psychology will be held on Friday, Jan. 29, from 7 p.m. at #2608. For the class in statistics, registration will be held on Thursday, Jan. 28, at #801 from 7:30 p.m.

Both courses are three unit credits for the San Francisco Jr. College and will be held in the evenings. Psychology is tentatively set for Tuesday and Friday evenings with the hours between 7:00 to 8:

30 p.m., and elementary statistics tentatively set for Monday and Thursday evenings with the hours between 7:00 to 9:00 p.m.

James Sakoda, a U. C. graduate in psychology and who has been conducting classes on "Personality and Adjustment" under the adult education, will be the psychology instructor. This course will include heredity and environment, motivation, emotions, re-

FIRST JUDICIAL COUNCIL HEARING
 IS CASE ON PEACE DISTURBANCE

The first Judicial Committee hearing, which tried the case of a resident charged in the complaint with disturbing the peace and destroying personal property, was held Friday morning, in the Council room at #1308. Walter Tsukanoto and Henry Taketa were the examiners.

The 12-men jury chosen

by lot from the Judicial Commission, representing one from each block recommended that the defendant be put on probation for 90 days and furthermore that his place of residence be moved to some other ward.

The recommendation furthermore stated that the defendant and his family be transferred to some other project, if possible. This was in compliance with the request made by the defendant, himself.

The trial was conducted in a regular court manner. As exhibit "A" a confession signed by the defendant was presented to the commission.

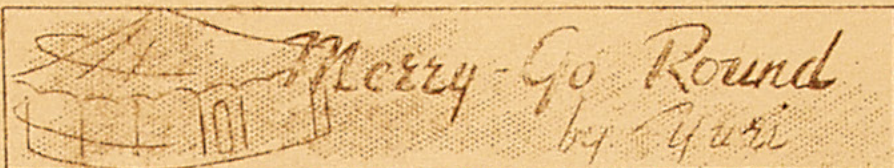
