PARENT-TEACHER ASSOCIATION ORGANIZE AT GRADE SCHOOLS

CLOSER TIES BETWEEN TWO FACTIONS ARE STRESSED BY ORGANIZATION

In order that the parent may have a closer relation with the school and its authorities, parents and teachers met at the three elementary schools last week to form a Parent Teachers Association.

Kenneth Harkness, supervisor of Education, was the chairman of the evening, and Martin P. Gunderson the speaker for the evening.

Gunderson stated that only through the P.T.A. could the parents understand what teachers were doing for their children and what the children were doing at school. He stressed that the aim was to have the parents responsible for the P.T.A. activities rather than the teachers.

Mr. Hayashi was chosen temporary chairman for the "Rim Rock" P.T.A. and James Takahara the chairman for the Washington P.T.A.

The Lincoln elementary appointed a committee rather than a temporary chairman. Those named on the committee were Mrs. Toriumi, Mrs. Ishikawa, Mrs. Igarashi, and Mrs. Sasaki.

CO-OP SERVICE FEATURE

CIRCULATING LIBRARY WILL BE ESTABLISHED

As one of the service features of the Co-op, a circulating library, in which best seller books and nationally known magazines will be available, will be established in the annex at 717-A as soon as necessary arrangements are completed, it

was announced by the research director, Takeo Yoshihara.

A limited number of Japanese books may also be put on the shelf. Japanese books are being solicited and those wishing to donate their books to the library are asked

to contact the Co-op.

Through the Co-op library service, it will be possible to purchase books, both fiction and technical, and magazines at a discount, it was disclosed.

GUEST EDITORIAL:

YOUR COOP PRIVILEGES

Everyone should be very much concerned over the present rate of purchases in the Community Stores which indicate that only 50% is by scrip and 50% in cash.

With the present volume of business, we will have about \$80,000 of net profit per year. According to the law, all non-recorded cash purchases are subject to income tax. Only recorded membership-purchase profits are exempt from tax. At the present rate 50% of our profits will be subject to income tax.

On the basis of the annual figures of \$100,000 profit, half of \$80,000, or \$40,000, will be subject to income tax if we continue to establish the present rate of 50% recorded patronage.

The rate of income tax is about 60% or more. This means that \$24,000 must be paid as income tax.

The above amount of \$24,000 is only the Federal Income Tax. To this amount must be added a very considerable sum of money out of the profits for the State Income Tax.

We must save all we possibly can, for we need funds for relocation. Twenty-odd thousand dollars is a huge sum to let it slip through our fingers when it can be saved and kept here.

There is only one way to save this income tax of over \$24,000 per annum. It is by use of scrip books when making purchases at the Co-op stores. Only recorded purchases are exempt from taxation. Scrip book record is the way your Co-op management keeps your patronage record. You must establish this record to save income tax.

Records of purchases made by non-members cannot be recognized at the time of patronage division.

Your one-dollar membership fee is only a loan. It will be refunded when you leave the Project or when the Co-op is liquidated. Therefore, everyone should join the Co-op.

Your one-dollar fee will add that much more to strengthen the financial structure of our Co-op.

OLD ENTERPRISES PROFIT

We have no record for patronage prior to December 1, 1942. According to the Government ruling, we may use as a basis of the present record that we are establishing, the patronage record between Dec. 1, 1942, to May 31, 1943. This ratio will be used to determine the non-taxable income of the old profits.

Therefore, the more record we establish, the more money we will be able to save on the old profits; and also, on the new profits.

SO JOIN THE CO-OP! Become an owner of a million-dollar enterprise. This means more money to the members as their equity. Use scrip and order Sears Roebuck mail orders through the Co-op. Use scrip for laundry services, and for all other business transactions where scrip is accepted.

(Note: Please don't confuse income tax with State Sales Tax. State Sales Tax must be paid scrip or cash, Co-op or no Co-op.)

FREE SERVICE GIVEN BY LEGAL DEPARTMENT

Are you getting married? Want to divorce your wife? How about your car "back home"? Want to sell it?

Your first step would be to see your Project attorney at the administration building for sound legal advice, or services.

Anthony O'Brien, who recently replaced Robert Throckmorton as the project attorney, is assisted by evacuee attorneys Walter Tsukamoto and Henry Taketa in handling all legal matters for the Colony residents.

PROPERTY PROBLEMS

The department is active, at present, in dealing with evacuee property problems. Groups such as the Co-operative and the Community Council consult this department in drawing up legal forms.

No fee is charged to any evacuee for services rendered by the department, but nominal expenses for recording, filing, notarization, and the like, are required to be borne by the clients.

OUTSIDE COUNSEL

Suitable arrangements may be made at the request of the evacuee clients to refer cases requiring outside attention to private counsel.

Community social welfare workers are usually called into cases involving divorce, delinquent children, family disputes, and other matters in which the services of welfare workers may be of value.

MORE OUTSIDE JOB OFFERS RECEIVED
