

### COUNCIL SENDS INVITATION TO SENATE GROUP

An invitation was issued by the Tule Lake Council this week to the Council Senate Military Affairs sub-committee to make the Tule Lake Project first stop-over on proposed investigation tour of the WRA centers.

Some of the members of the sub-committee went on record recently in Washington as suggesting that the residents in the WRA conters are being "coddled" and "pampered" by the administration, and proposed that the centers be turned over to the Army from the present civil authorities. Before taking any definite stop toward that end, the commi-ttee proposed to make invostigation of those charges.

The letter addressed to the Senate sub-committoe declared that the City Council and the ovacuces will give full cooperation in facilitating its investigation.

"You and your members will be given privileges of living in one of our quartors," the Council invitation said, "and cat in our block moss halls and do toilet in block shower-rocms."

#### BE FORMED COMMITTEE TO EXECUTIVE

The formation of an! executive committee, labor relation board and reports on relocation and co-op were discussed at the City Council meeting Wednesday afternoon.

The executive committoe when formed will handle the routine administrative work of the council. The policy making function will be carried on by the latter body.

It is planned to have one council representative from each ward to serve part time on a volunteer basis on the committee.

The question of setting up a machinery to mediate labor problems problems was discussed.

It was suggested that a board of three be set up to act as a mediating body. This group will mest whenever large probloms arise.

The Council decided to assist the co-op in furthering the sale scrips and on their menbership drive.

Harry Mayeda, Council president, announced that because of the shortage of water creation of ice rinks or further use of water in the old rinks would be discouraged.

### MARRIED WITH INCOME OF \$1200 IN 1942 MUST FILE TAX RETURN EARNINGS EXCEEDING \$500 MADE BY SINGLE PERSONS MUST BE REPORTED

Every single person his gross income is equal nort file a Federal income to or greater than the tax return whose gross Licome for the year from all sources was \$500 or core; that is, as much as \$9.62 per week. Widows, widowers, divorceen, and Larried persons separated by mutual consent, are classed as single persons.

Every married person, living with husband or wife throughout the year, rust file a return if his or her gross income tocother with any income of the spouse, was as much as \$1,200 for the year; that is, as much as \$25.08 per week. If husband and wife both have an income, they must both make a return. Such return may be ade separately, or, if they are both citizens or residents, they may make a joint return. A joint return may be made by husband and wife even though one has no income, and a cint return is advisable in the case of persons, one of whom has no income, who marry during the year, since the personal exeach spouse during tho toriod of premarital status, is allowable in a leint roturn.

A joint return must be signed by both husband and wife, and verified by a mitten declaration that is made under the penlties of perjury.

### SEPARATE RETURNS

Where separate returns rie' filed by husband and wife on Form 1040, the int personal exemption the wable (\$1,200 where the married status has existed throughout tho cither or divided between them in any proportion agreed upon. If separate noturns are filed one may tot. report income which bolongs to the other, but ust report only the income which belongs to him (or her).

No person is exempt from filing a return if

amount specified above for his classification. Meither the Prosident of the United States, nor the Vice President, nor Federal judges, nor Monbors of Congress, are exempt from filing returns.

Moroovor, all from whatever source, unloss specifically excluded by statute, must reported in the return. The types of income specifically exempt are listed in the instructions accompanying the roturn forn.

#### SIMPLIFIED FORM

A person whose gross income does not exceed \$3,000, and consists wholly of salary, wages, dividends, interest, or annuities, may make a Simplified Return on Form 1040A, in which tho tax due may be readily ascertained by reference to a table contained in the form.

A husband and wife liring together on July 1 of the taxable your may file separate Simplified Returns if the gross in-cone of each is from the prescribed sources and does not exceed \$3,000,or they may file a single joint return on that form if their combined income is from the prescribed sources and does not exceed \$5,000. A taxpayer may not, however, file a Simplified Return if the other spouse files a return on Form 1040.

## THE , WRONG ANCESTORS" IS CREGONIAN FEATURE STORY

"The Wrong Ancestors" so the Portland Oregonian titled a two full page fedture on the fate of the 110,000 Japanese Ame -ricans in this country. The article was the first of the Sunday magazino peries written by Mol Ard rold, who wan sent by the regonian to Minidoka to make an eyewitness appratral of life of the evasuces.

The headlines stated at "This Is a Question Which Poses Major Test lor American Democracy," followed by a sub-head, "Doy are charged with no crime; they are accused of no sabotage. They had the wrong ancestors."

Thus the article tells of the livelihood of tho evacuees in the city of barracks--walking in mud, furnishing the meager apartments, leaving the Project to save the sugar crop, and their experionce in Twin Falls and nearby wities.

Several illustrations were drawn by evacuees, which included the layout of the colony, inside of an apartment, a truck battling the mud and a pitiful nisei girl sitting on a "no trespassing" si-

gn. The article for this coming Sunday is to be titled 'How loyal are tho Japanese evacuees."

To alleviate plaints and misunderstanding by the customers, the following now pelicies are being observed by the Co-op:
