Since we have been relocated in a WRA camp, we are calling the world outside "shaba" without knowing its origin. This word is a colloquial form of the Buddhist language. "Saha" is the Sanscrit language of India which corresponds to a Chinese (nindo). Nindo word, means "place of perseverance". In other words, it means a place where cople must have patience to get along.

I would call this camp in which we live today, therefore, "shaba in shaba" where there is an urgent need for intelligent readjustment to the change in our life instead of living unconcernedly.

In other words, we must make this camp a training ground for spiritual as well as physical well-being to prepare curselves for the future. Only by so doing, we can discover the true meaning of life.
