BUYING CENTER IS PROPOSED

The proposed central buying office for cooperatives in WRA centers to be established in Salt Lake City is expected to enable saving of a tremendous sum of money to Co-op members.

The saving comes from placing orders directly with manufacturers in a large quantity, enabling the central office to bargain for better prices, and by eliminating commission paid to various salesmen.

J.A.C.L. Investigation Report

The Planning Board has been conducting a study as to the truth of various rumors and suspicions voiced by the public, regarding the attitude and steps taken by the J.A.C.L., pertaining to the recently issued Selective Service order by the Army.

And to that end the Board has gone through more than 300 pages of the minutes of the various J.A.C.L. meetings, and especially of the convention which took place at Salt Lake City last November. After a detailed scrutiny of other records as well, the Planning Board has decided to present for publication the following points of importance:

A RESOLUTION:

TO THE WAR DEPARTMENT SELECTIVE SERVICE DIVISION FROM J.A.C.L.

Whereas, we Americans of Japanese ancestry believe that our welfare and our destiny are inextricably bound up in the welfare and destiny of these United States of America; and

Whereas, we desire to contribute our share to the winning of the war and the peace to follow; and

Whereas, many of us now have brothers, sons, and husbands who are serving with distinction and valor in the armed forces of our country; and

Whereas, it has been called to our attention that Americans of Japanese ancestry have been and are being classified in the Selective Service rolls in those classifications originally assigned to "enemy aliens" and "friendly aliens" but now designated as classifications for those "unfit" or "undesirable" for military services; and

Whereas, as American citizens entitled to participate in the common lot and life of all Americans, we do resent and decry this unwarranted and unjust discrimination which questions our loyalty and allegiance to our country;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE SPECIAL EMERGENCY MEETING OF THE JAPANESE AMERICAN CITIZENS LEAGUE, CONVISED IN SALT LAKE CITY, UTAH, THAT WE DO HEREBY REQUEST THE SELECTIVE SERVICE DIVISION OF THE WAR DEPARTMENT TO RECLASSIFY AMERICANS OF JAPANESE ANCESTRY ON THE SAME BASIS AS ALL OTHER AMERICANS,

Since the announcement of the nation-wide shoe rationing peoples have been digging into their duffbags for anything bearing semblance to shoes and have been hauling them up to the shoe shop for renovation. The shelves are lined four high with anything from Florsheims to J.G. Pennyspecials.

RECENT NOTE OF J.A.C.L. TO WAR DEPARTMENT IS RELEASED IN FULL

Upon receiving the announcement that the nisei would be accepted as volunteers in the U.S. Army, the J.A.C.L. sent the following message to the War Department, Selective Service Division:

(1) All persons of Japanese ancestry now serving in the armed forces of the United States to receive all the rights and privileges accorded American citizens and especially American soldiers, including the right to travel freely in any part of the United States. This includes the right to visit the relocation centers in the Western Defense Command, including the prohibited areas.

(2) All persons of Japanese ancestry now serving in the armed forces of the United States be granted permission to seek transfer to this special combat unit, if they so desire.

(3) All persons of Japanese ancestry now serving in the armed forces of the United States, or all those who will volunteer for same, to be given equal opportunities to attend Officers' Candidate Schools.

(4) All Japanese nationals who now have sons

in the armed forces, or whose sons will volunteer and be accepted for the armed forces, be accorded the designation as well as all the rights and privileges of "Friendly Aliens," rather than "Enemy Aliens," by the Department of Justice; and that they be given special aid in resettlement if they are now residing in WRA relocation centers.

(5) All young women of Japanese ancestry be permitted to enlist for the WAACS on the same basis as other American women.

CITY COUNCIL

FORMATION OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE IS DECIDED

Formation of an executive committee of five in number, including the executive secretary of the City Council to handle administrative work, was decided at the City Council meeting Wednesday afternoon.

All routine work will be cleared through this committee which is to meet daily from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m.

The organization and planning committee is working on a plan for a commissioner type of a council. Under this plan the fields of employment will be divided into departments with a qualified councilman at the head.

Committee studying the water situation reported that the water in the main tank has gone down to a dangerous level and that water should not be used for making ice rinks. Use of water per person on the Project far exceed that used on the outside, it was stated.

Partial report of the study still being made by the relocation committee on the resettlement program was submitted.

Since many offers of employment are sent by telegram, more complete information on job offers are desired, the committee stated.

Clarification should be made on the relation of draft and leave clearance. Many evacuees are reluctant to accept employment when the deferrable status of jobs offered is uncertain. The complete report of the committee will be made at the next council meeting.

Yoshimi Shibata said that procedure for sale of shoes through ration will be announced soon.
