TSUKAMOTO VOLUNTEERS FOR U.S. ARMY

Walter Tsukamoto, former attorney in the Legal department and JACL leader, has volunteered his services to the United States Army in a telegram to the War Department, according to the Feb. 11 issue of the Pacific Citizen.

"I have requested inmediate active duty and assignment to my commanding general five times since the war but was advised my Japanese ancestry precluded such assignment. I have been a reserve officer continually since 1927, and my sole reason for becoming an officer was, of course, to serve my country in time of need. May I beg of you to bring about my immediate assignment. My wife and five children, all loyal Americans, join with me in this request", tho telegram said, according to the Citizen.

Tsukameto holds a reserve commission as a captain and is now in

Chicago.
