TELETYPE FROM MYER REPORTS ON 7 CENTERS

Reporting on the progress of registration of seven of the relocation centers, a teletype message was received from Dillen S. Myer, national director of the WRA today. According to latest

reports, Minidoka is setting the pace among the Projects, with registration 92 per cent completed. At Tule Lake, 2098 were registered by nightfall Wednesday, although only 1550 were accounted for on the date of the teletype count.

The figures released by Myer as of Feb. 23 for the other Projects were Central Utah 4252, Granada 2725, Gila River 2288, Heart Mountain 1135 and Elmer 558.

PANEL WILL ISSUE RATION BOOKS TO PERSONS LEAVING PROJECT

Establishment of a panel to pass rationing books to those leaving for outside employment was outlined in a letter received from the Office of Price Administration.

The establishment of a panel will eliminate the necessity of evacuees making applications directly

to local boards after they are released.

Colonists should apply for the books at the time of applying for leave.

The books, however will not be issued until the leave has been authorized.

Book 2 in addition to Book 1 will be issued in accordance with established procedure.

The panel will be composed of one member of the rationing board closest to the relocation center, Project Director or Assistant Director, and the third will be a member appointed by the Project Director.

All necessary forms shall be provided by the local board.

Miss Hisanaga evacuated from the coast along with the others of Japanese ancestry and in the due process switched her matriculation from Pomona

to Oberlin. When the evacuation order followed Pearl Harbor, the entire college student body and its brass band turned out to bid her farewell.

President E. Wilson Lyon of Pomona College forwarded her B.A. degree to Oberlin by proxy. She has two brothers in the U.S. army, Sergt. Dennis Hisanaga, former Pomona College football captain, and Kaz Hisanaga.

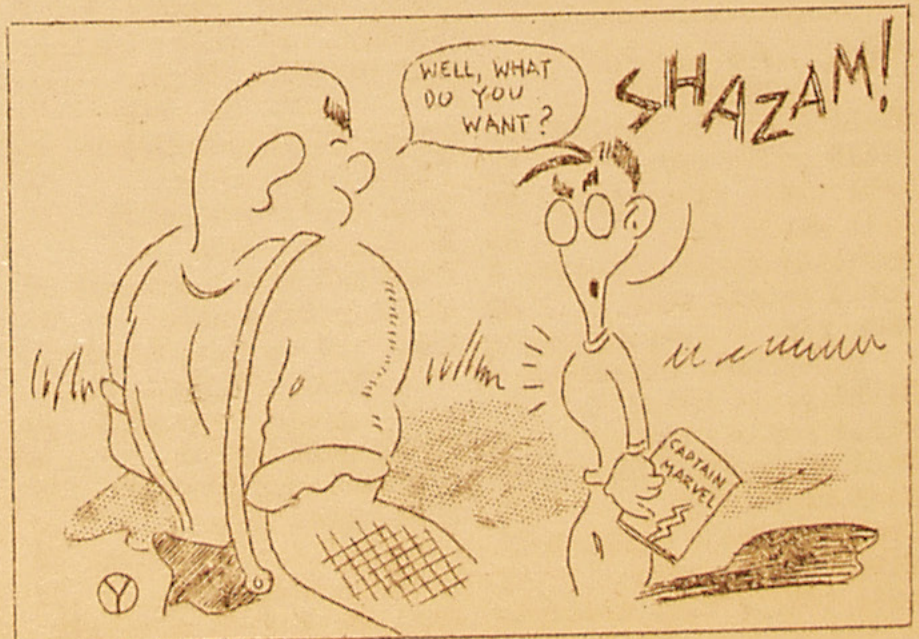
