## HOG FARM TO BE MAJOR PORK PRODUCTION CENTER

The Project hog farm, based on new grounds, a short distance beyond the first bend of North Castle Rock Mountain, is steadily looming into a Colony industry of importance. The present plant, with a herd of some one thousand fifty hogs, constitutes Greater Basin's largest, and will rank as a leader in Northern California as a major pork production center.

Plant building operations will be concluded during the latter part of spring. The present plant lay out includes: six pen-units, each about one city block in size; and a central maintenance unit. The whole farm constitutes an area approximately the size of one ward section.

Mess food-surpluses, provide the main source of feed for the porkers. A milled barley ration, (native grown grains) is also available in the pens, in automatic feeders.

Through facilities of mechanized equipment; rapid and thorough freshening of grounds is conducted to maintain sanitary conditions on a high plane. Latest protective measures against disease epidemics, hog cholera, are given each animal by immunization.

Four community houses; have been constructed on the central unit. House #A is the breeding center. House #B is the "maternity hospital"—farrowing center. House #C is the fattening center for potential "mill" animals. House #D is center of butchering operations. Base Hospital technicians extend research studies here. Even two sheep, strictly Hospital property, are kept on the farm to further serve as "guinea pigs".

The foundation herd, numbering a few hundred heads, is composed of purebred animals. Breeds represented are: Chester Whites, Poland Chinas, Berkshires, and Hampshires. Outstanding boars are purebred Poland Chinas, descendants

of famed "Golden Rod" — king of champions from the Rebecca Payne Livingston Foundation of San Miguel, California. Outstanding sows are purebred Hampshires from the Henzel Farms of Malin, Oregon. These animals are all registered pedigree stock, sanctioned and certified by Union Stock Yards of Chicago.

Scott Warren, alumnus of U.C., is supervisor of the hog farm. 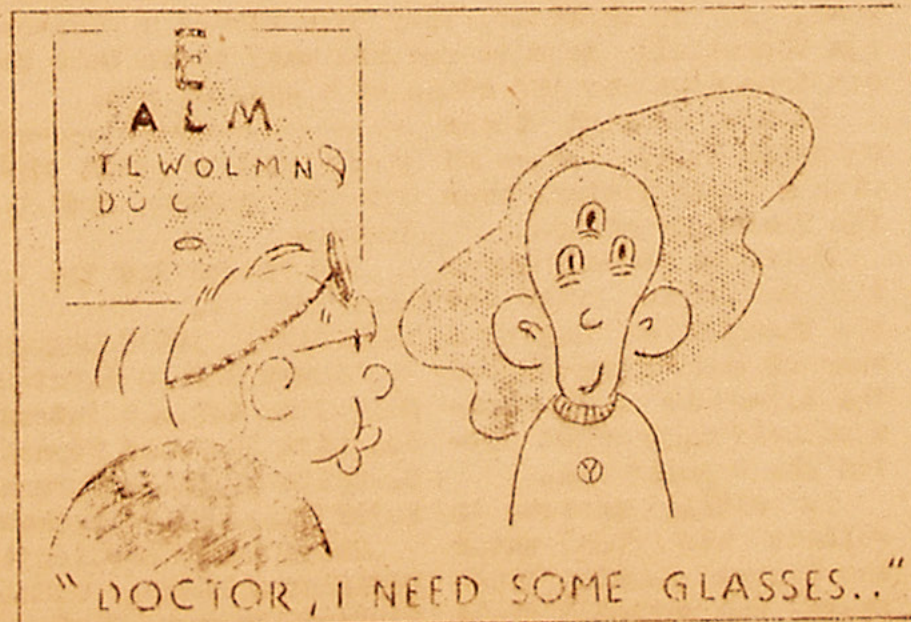
