## POSTON, GILA ARE IN FREE ZONE

## Escorts Are Not Needed In Reclassified Strip

The proclamation by General DeWitt putting the Poston and Gila River Projects in the free zone makes it possible for 245 persons from Arizona to return to their former homes in Arizona.

This shift of the exclusion line reclassifies a strip approximately 69 miles south of the former line and removes Poston and Gila, together with all of the Pinal and most of Maricopa and Yuma counties from the evacuated area. This decision by the Secretary of War was announced by the Western Defense Command on Thursday March 4. It went into effect midnight Thursday.

Hereafter, eva-

cues visiting Poston and Gila will not need escorts unless they pass through evacuated area enroute.

## NEVER A DULL MOMENT IN LIFE OF WAAC SAY LIEUTENANT HORAK

Oh, for the life of a WAAC!

Charming and vivacious First Lieutenant Henriette Horak of the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps gave a surprisingly large group of interested "would-be's" an interesting picture of the life of a WAAC.

The typical day for a WAAC in training starts at 6:15 a.m. Reveille or roll call at 6:30--and then breakfast. The first class which starts at 7:30 is close drill. Other classes take up the morning until dinner at 12:00.

"It's not a 'lunch' but a good meal--army food is good", said Lieutenant Horak.

Then after dinner, close drill and exercises continue for 45 minutes and classes until 5:00. Retreat, mess again, and the evening is free with



The Central Utah Relocation Project, also known as the Topaz WRA, is situated in a desert-like basin about 150 miles south of Salt Lake City. Its inhabitants are for the most part from the San Francisco Bay region, including San Francisco, Oakland and Alameda.

Divided into some 40 odd blocks, the project is quite like ours. The camp itself is almost as large as Tule Lake, its block units being more spread out than ours. Wash rooms, lavatories, mess halls and laundry rooms are situated between the two rows of barracks that comprise the blocks.

Sanitary system and facilities are far superior to the ones installed here in that there are some dozen or dozen and a half shower spouts in one shower room and porcelain wash basins with individual hot and cold outlets for each basin.

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the exception of one hour of compulsory study hall. Lights go out at 10:00.

There are many types of work opportunities, the chance to specialize in certain fields and excellent opportunities for advancement.

There are 162 persons in a company. Trained as a company, this group moves into a station or fort, and that many number of men move out and thus are relieved for combat duty.

When questioned if there was anything she found unpleasant about her life in the WAAC's-- "Yes, that second typhoid shot!" Lieutenant Horak answered.

"Never a dull moment, life is interesting and it's fun", she said--but of course there's hard work involved and remember girls, you're in for the duration and six months."



# UNEMPLOYMENT GRANTS CLARIFIED

To clarify the unemployment compensation, Frank D. Fagan, Placement Officer, released the following statement:

An evacuee who has been registered for work for 15 days and has not been offered employment shall be eligible for unemployment compensation unless:

A. He has refused to accept suitable employment offered to him and there were, in the opinion of the Employment Officer, no valid grounds for the refusal, or

B. He has been discharged for cause, and, after a hearing by the

Each one is also equipped with a mirror and shelf for shaving purposes. The interior of the lavatories are plaster boarded and painted.

In contrast, the mess system is not up to the Tule Lake par. The residents are required to stand in line as they receive their food, cafeteria style. When the repast is finished, they bring their own plates and utensils to the clearing table. Often, a 10 to 20 minute wait is necessitated. Our mess halls are quite a bit larger and more help is employed here.

Individual apartments are almost identical with those we have here. The same type of stoves are installed. One thing that was evident was the scarcity of lumber. There wasn't a single porch or shelter in view. Co-op stores are woefully behind our setup. There are but two stores, both inadequately stocked. Tule Lake's canteen at 719 in the earlier days of our City offered more commodities than the Topaz community stores.

During the last hot, dusty summer, the stores were almost without soda pops and ice cream.

C. The Employment Officer certifies that the evacuee is unqualified for employment because of physical incapacity, or

D. The Welfare Section certifies the evacuee is unqualified for employment because of family situations.

Only those evacuees who have made application and are given unemployment compensation shall be entitled to clothing allowances.

Evacuees who are eligible for unemployment compensation and have applied for same shall receive a supplementary allowance for clothing for himself and each of his dependents.

Those eligible for unemployment compensation should make application at the Placement Office at their earliest convenience.
