STAFF SGT. KAJIKAWA PROUD MEMBER OF 100TH INFANTRY

A veteran of Pearl Harbor and a member of the famed Hawaiian 100th Infantry Division is Staff Sergeant Hideo Kajikawa who is visiting relatives on this Project.

Staff Sergeant Kajikawa was stationed at Camp McCoy, Wisconsin until two months ago and then he was transferred with other members of his division to Camp Shelby, Miss., where the new nisei combat unit will be trained.

Says the nisei staff sergeant about the widely publicized Hawaiian Division: "We were treated famously at Camp McCoy.

"Our boys," the soldier related, "have really built up a reputation as a crack outfit. I remember during maneuvers the opposing forces considered it a rare honor when they captured one of our men.

"Camp Shelby," according to the Staff Sergeant "is a huge camp. Negro, white and nisei troops are stationed there with the majority being whites," Kajikawa related. "The Japanese Americans are treated as Caucasians," he added.

Staff Sergeant Kajikawa was of the belief that volunteering for the Army was the best way to prove nisei loyalty to the U.S.

The 100th Infantry Division member is formerly from Hood River, Ore. He was inducted into the Army in Hawaii and has been in the service for over two years.

ARMY BOUND:

Kristovich Is Called Into Army

Peter Kristovich, personable associate chief of Internal Security terminated his services today, in preparation for his departure on Mar. 23, to join Uncle Sam's fighting forces.

He has received orders to report for induction at San Jose on April 1. "Well, I knew it was coming sometime and now that it has, I'm glad," Mr. Kristovich replied in answer to how he felt about being called in the armed forces.

He expressed a preference for the Military Police field of the Army service since that is the field in which he has been trained for the last three years, eight months of that time having been spent on this Project.

Mrs. Kristovich is expected to join her husband tomorrow morning for a short visit on the Project, until their departure on the 23th.

Indignant Lad Writes Home

Replying to a resolution passed by a group of prominent men at Hanford, California, to the effect that no references shall be given to any persons of Japanese descent now in relocation centers wishing to go to school or find outside employment, a resident of Arkansas Center decrying such action wrote to one of the papers in that town.

"This is one voiced from a small minority who at present is unable to defend itself against public persecution which are without ground.

"The minority whose birthplace is the United States, who was reared and educated here, taught in school that democracy meant equality regardless of race or creed.

"Yet, the very subject taught us and to all other Americans is not practiced in society.

"Recently some prominent men in Hanford, your town and which I still call my town passed a resolution.

"Are these men ignor-

ant of the WRA's plan to resettle the evacuees?

"The resolution is a terrible shock to us. We are regrettably shamed that the town we respected and believed to be a typical democratic Amer-

ican has resorted to such method like Nazism.

"Those people who call themselves "patriotic" question our loyalty but we citizens of Japanese descent question theirs to our country, the U.S.A.

FORFEIT GIVES 29'ERS CENTRAL LEAGUE CROWN CHAMPIONS TO MEET PACER JRS. SOON; SAC TO CUBS TAKE SECOND PLACE

Block "29'ers" annexed the Central League Championship without any effort at all last Monday, as the B block 19 team forfeited the last game of the season to them. The champs went through an undefeated campaign of seven games.

This week the 29'ers will meet the undefeated South League Champions, Pacer Jrs. for the city 14

years and under division title. The Pacers swept through a nine game schedule unscathed.

Sac'to Cubs cinched second place in the standings by downing the Red Devils, 21-15. Cubs season record boasts one loss against six victories.
