PROCEDURE SET UP FOR SHOE RATIONING

Block Managers Are Taking Applications

A procedure has been set-up in the colony to expedite the shoe rationing in accordance with the national rationing program whereby colonists will be able to purchase shoes, Ted Nakamura, executive secretary of the Block Managers revealed today.

Colonists who have turned in their Sugar Ration Books may apply for shoe ration cards with their respective block managers. These ration cards may be used to purchase shoes at the canteen or any place in the United States.

Those who have not been issued sugar ration books or have lost them, may make application at the 717 Co-op office. Due to the present shortage of these cards, only those with immediate need for shoes should apply.

Infants using shoes size four or smaller do not need cards to purchase shoes and will not be issued cards, Nakamura added.

Paul Fleming and Don Elbersen, supervisors of the community service and community enterprises, respectively, are working with the Tule Lake Rationing Board to handle the rationing in the colony.

All those who are interested in visiting the poultry farm are welcome to come, Makino stated.

Poultry Farm Will Soon Supply Colony Needs

By this summer when the chicken house is completed, there will be 36,000 chickens which will amply supply the poultry needs of the colonists, according to Harry Makino, general manager.

To accommodate the expected increase in chickens, the construction department is building 16 more chicken houses to provide the birds with adequate housing facilities.

There are at present over 5,000 chicks which supply the colony daily with 6,900 eggs.

What poultry meat is available is taken to the hospital for their use.

COMMON PEOPLE ARE GRAND, RELOCATED TULEAN WRITES

SOLDIERS FROM WAR IN FAR EAST DEFEND TULEAN JAPANESE FOLK

Fumi Sakamoto, former executive secretary and research director of the co-op and now a student at the Rochdale Institute in New York City, relates her experiences in New York and her trip there in a letter to Mr. and Mrs. Don Elbersen.

Telling of her trip east, Miss Sakamoto mentions that "At Salt Lake, the bus picked up two sailors, home on a leave after 4 years in the far East, seeing action in China, Solomons, as well as Guadalcanal.

"They recognized my nationality and insisted on talking to me everything Japanese, until I finally escaped to the rear seat for a much needed sleep. According to a soldier, they defended me and the Japanese people very vociferously during the night when a chance remark was made by a fellow passenger."

Don, the common people, represented by those who travel by the bus, are grand. And as for New York, I am happy, very happy," she went on.

She tells of the possibilities of using evacuees in the cooperative movement and of the many jobs open, especially in the line of secretarial work. Many jobs are offered her and there are many prospects for more in using evacuees. She sums the job opportunities up by saying that it is too bad that she can't be 10 persons at the same time.

She is sharing an apartment with a bookkeeper at \$45 per month, with room enough for another girl.

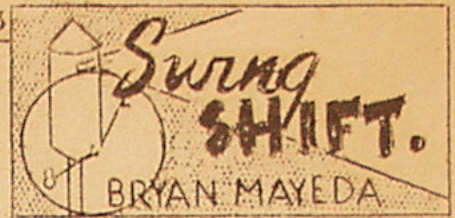
