Another call for volunteer blood donors has been made by Reece M. Pedicord, chief medical officer.

This call has been necessitated by the alarmingly low waiting list of donors and the large number of operations that have been and are being made at the Base Hospital, according to an announcement made by Dr. Pedicord.

To expedite the typing of donors, the volunteers will be asked to come by blocks. The time and number of blocks will be published at a future date.

WRA WILL PROVIDE FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE FOR RESETTLEMENT

AID TO BE IN FORM OF CASH GRANTS; MAXIMUM LIMIT SET

Transportation and early living expenses may be paid by the WRA to evacuees who leave the Project on indefinite leave and who need financial assistance, according to an announcement received here today by Project Director Harvey M. Coverley. This new policy, Mr. Coverley said, will make it possible for many evacuees with limited funds to accept job offers which they might otherwise have to turn down.

Financial assistance will be rendered by WRA in the form of cash grants made at the time an evacuee leaves the Project. The maximum grant which may be made will cover coach fare for each member of the immediate family; \$3 per person for meals on route for each day of travel; and, to meet initial living expenses at the place of employment, \$50 for the wage earner, plus \$25 for each of two dependents.

AN EDITORIAL:

THE SCHOOL SITUATION

Education is a dynamic intangible force that cannot be measured in ordinary terms. School children as a general rule are not in the position to recognize the importance of sound scholastic training. Therefore, it is the duty of the parents to see that their children receive an adequate education.

The school board in this city has long struggled under adverse conditions to see that the children of this colony receive the best education possible. They are not interested in forcing children to attend school. They are interested in teaching students who co-operate with them by attending school.

Kenneth Harkness, superintendent of Education, declared that "if the teachers were not interested in their students, they would have resigned long ago."

All colonists know that the registration program employed the teachers to assist in registering the colonists. The teachers did not ask for the job but were practically forced to assist. The registration took time and school was unavoidably delayed. Now with registration completed the schools have opened their doors. As if all the troubles the school board has had to contend with was not enough, there are now many rumors, about the school and its system, that is out and out sabotaging the school effort in its fight to provide the finest education possible.

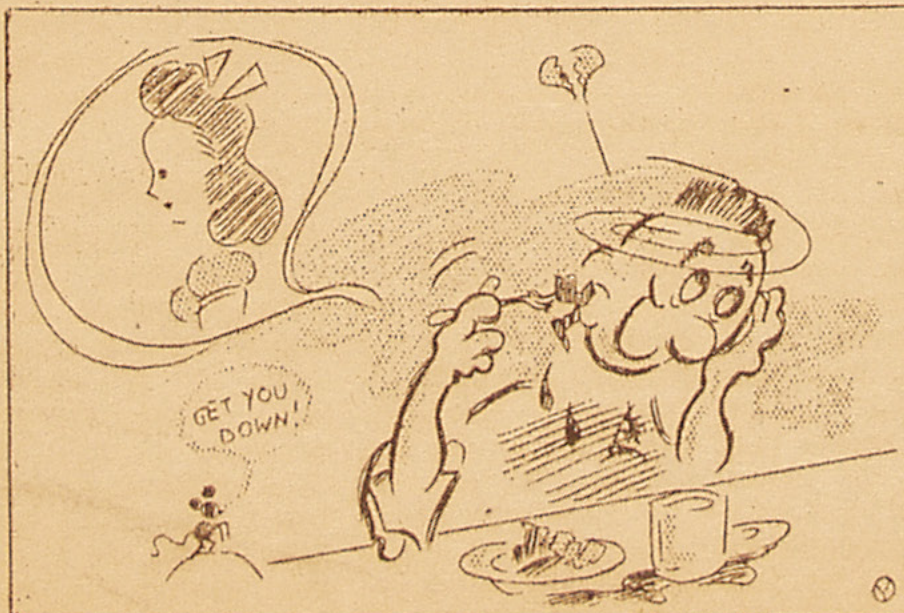
"The school board," according to Mr. Harkness, "is willing to test the truth of these rumors." They are anxious to know the truth and are equally anxious in squelching all unfounded rumors.

Let us in responsible positions, as friends, relatives and parents of these students instill in all youngsters the soundness and importance of at least high school training.

The handicapped teachers are carrying on. Let us also carry on for the sake of our children, ourselves and the sympathetic and faithful teachers who deserve all our co-operation

FINANCIAL AID FOR RESETTLEMENT

(Continued from page 1) that the evacuee has insufficient funds to cover transportation costs, plus initial living expenses, the Project Director is authorized to issue a cash grant to make up the difference.

It is not necessary for all members of the family to leave the center at the same time in order to receive cash grant assistance. The wage earner may go out first, establish himself in his new place of employment, and then send for his family. Only that part of the family grant allowance which he needs to meet his own expenses will be issued when he leaves the centers. The remainder will be issued for the use of his dependents when they go out to join him.
