STUDENTS INELIGIBLE TO RETURN AFTER APR. 2

TO QUIT, PUPIL MUST HAVE FORM FILLED OUT

Students who have not returned to the high school since the reopening last week will have their last opportunity to return for this quarter on Friday, Martin P. Gunderson, principal of the high school, stated today.

Those absent due to illness, however, will be excused while those who do not return will be ineligible to re-enter until next quarter commencing from April 30.

Some misunderstanding on the part of students and parents is evident in regard to discontinuing school to

work, Gunderson disclosed.

To clarify this, it was reiterated that those wishing to discontinue permanently must call at the office of the high school principal for a request form to be filled by the students, parents or guardians. All school supplies, must likewise be returned before the request will be granted.

School authorities will consider those who have not re-enter before Wednesday as dropped, but the students may reenroll before Friday night.

Fading into Eternity, as the smoke of my cigarette faded into the wind coursing across the flat plains...

So I thought as I sat atop Castle Rock and smoked. After a while, I got up and walked down the mountain.
