

PROVISIONS FOR ISSUING INDEFINITE LEAVE GIVEN

PROJECT DIRECTOR MAY GRANT CLEARANCE

Indefinite leaves may be granted to evacuees by the Project Director under any one of the following circumstances according to regulations received from Washington, D.C.

1-The applicant proposes to accept an employment offer or offer of support that has been referred to the Project Director by a Relocation Officer of the War Relocation Authority; or the applicant is the wife, child, or other dependent of an evacuee who proposes to accept such an offer, and the applicant wishes to accompany or join him.

2-The applicant is a parent who is going to live with son or daughter.

3-The applicant is a son or daughter going to live with one or both parents.

4-The applicant has not reached his seventeenth birthday and is going to live with relatives or friends.

5-The applicant is wife going to live with her husband, or a husband going to live with his wife.

6-The applicant proposes to marry a person living out- (Cont. on Page 3)

Under present arrangements, the Co-op receives a five per cent net discount from Sears and 10 per cent less minor expenses from Montgomery Ward. Both mail order houses have been requested to give special attention to orders placed through the canteens.

For efficiency and convenience, a weekly list of unavailable goods is being sent to the Co-op, thereby eliminating the cancellation of

orders.

Although individual customers will not receive direct discounts, benefits will be obtained in form of patronage dividends when such are declared.

Urgent Need Of Blood Donors Emphasized

The urgent need of a large waiting list of volunteer blood donors was emphasized by William Sugiyama and Shigeki Ishida, laboratory technicians, in charge of the present blood typing drive.

He declared that from one to three hours may be lost, if such a list is not available, gravely

endangering the patient's life. From 15 to 30 prospective donors may have to be located, typed, and sub-typed, whereas only about four donors need be checked if a list is on hand.

The WRA is bending every effort in getting evacuees resettled. They have removed the red tape of having to wait for clearances and are lining up the best job offers that come their way.

You will be co-operating with this progressive relocation program and at the same time you will be opening wide the door of opportunity for yourself.

Caucasian Mother Of Soldier Aims To Promote Tolerance

An American mother with three sons-in-law and one son in the army wrote an open letter to all Japanese Americans which was featured in the Colorado Center paper. She is Patricia K. Alexander, Box 444, Springfield, Minnesota.

I have three sons-in-law and one son in the armed forces. My boys are not out there fighting Japanese, or Germans, or Italians. They are fighting the evil force abroad in our world.

That there exists any prejudice in America is something which hurts me greatly. That which is Good should be free to All who can appreciate it.

Is there any member of

your community who can write interestingly of conditions, surroundings, the feelings and thoughts of people there, who would enjoy telling me all about it? Either sex, any age, just so that it is someone who could look upon me as "mother" to whom anything could be told.

My purpose in all this, frankly, is that my daughter might have a better understanding of Japanese-Americans, and in her writing, might convey, sympathetically, to her readers the sort of feeling toward them which might help erase any lurking prejudice.

Buildings For Soldiers' Home

Tacoma's Japanese Language school and the Buddhist Church have been suggested as temporary homes for soldiers who are in the city on leave by Ray F. Roberts, a prominent member of the Tacoma post of the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

With Tacoma's population swelled close to the 200,000 mark by war workers and soldiers, or almost double its normal population, housing has been an acute problem.

"Soldiers have been forced to sleep on floors, benches and in all types of improvised beds. With the big two story Buddhist Church and the three story Japanese Language School empty...they could well be turned into homes for the visiting soldiers, Roberts declared.

NEW PROVISION FOR GRANTING INDEFINITE LEAVE LISTED

side & Relocation Center and live with him, or her as the case may be.

Provisions that must also be satisfied are:

1-The applicant has registered for leave clearance either on DSS Form 304-A and Form WRA 1264, or on Form WRA 126, Revised, during the special military registration in February and March.

2-His answer to Question 28 was an unqualified affirmative.

3-He has not applied for repatriation or expatriation.

4-He is not a paroled alien.

5-His application for leave clearance has neither been denied nor suspended by the Director.

6-His proposed place of employment or residence is not within the Eastern Defense Command.

If the above conditions can be satisfied, and the Project Director believes, upon the basis of his investigation in the Project, that there is no reasonable ground to believe the issuance of indefinite leave would interfere with the War Program, or otherwise endanger the possible peace and security, indefinite leave may be issued even though the evacuee has not previously received leave clearance.
