## NISEI DRAFT POSSIBLE

### SENATOR CHANDLER ENCOURAGES SEGREGATION OF NISEI

According to the April 8 issue of the Pacific Citizen which quotes a dispatch from the Washington bureau of the Los Angeles Times, compulsory military service for loyal Americans of Japanese ancestry now in War Relocation Centers appeared probable this week, with the army deciding which individuals are trustworthy.

The idea of requiring Pacific Coast evacuees of military age to report for induction under selective service procedures seemed likely to be adopted by the War Department, following a conference between Assistant Secretary of War McCloy and Senator A. B. Chandler, D., Ky., chairman of the Senate military affairs sub-committee which has been investigating the handling of the evacuation problem.
