announced by Lorne Huycke, Leave officer this week.

It will take as long as two or three months, before such applicants can receive advice as to the action being taken by Washington.

Until clarification can be made, applicants for leave clearance cannot leave the Project, it was emphasized.

Unnecessary confusion and disappointment will result if such persons a pply for seasonal or inlefinite leaves.
