

Seven Mess Halls Judged Most Sanitary By Corps Three Are Repeaters

For the period between Mar. 15 to Apr. 15, routine inspections conducted by members of the Sanitary Corps show that mess halls in Blocks 6, 29, 22, 8, 48, 56 and 68 are the most sanitary and most improved in their respective wards, according to Henry Omachi, chairman of the corps.

For Blocks 29, 22, and 8 it was the second time elected.

Special mention was given to the mess halls in Ward 5 where the keenest competition was experienced.

"As a whole," said Omachi, "the Project mess halls should be highly commended as they have shown considerable improvement in sanitary conditions during the past month."

REPATRIATION APPLICATIONS MAY BE ALTERED - JACOBY PROCEDURE GIVEN TO CHANGE, CANCEL FORMS

Repatriation applications may be altered according to a statement made by Harold S. Jacoby, Project Internal Security head. However, there are certain lines of procedure which must be followed. In order to change or cancel the form, all those who made out forms prior to Feb. 1 must write a letter to the Spanish Embassy in Washington, D.C. as applications filed

before that date have already been routed through the WRA authorities to the Embassy. After a reply has been received from the Embassy, the letter should be brought to the Internal Security office in the Administration building. This is to notify the project authorities of the change. Unless the project authorities are informed of this change, the records will be hopelessly confused.

GREATEST BOND DRIVE IN HISTORY UNDERWAY

The greatest war bond drive in the history of the country began Apr. 15 and will end Apr. 30. During this two-week period the government hopes to raise thirteen billion dollars.

To accomplish this, every American earning an income is expected to buy at least one bond during this period.

The government is concentrating on the sale of \$500 bonds. The actual cost of bonds of this denomination is only \$375. If the full amount cannot be paid all at once, semi-monthly or monthly payments will be arranged.

Mrs. Ruth Busselle, personnel officer, Ad building, will arrange for whatever denominational bond you wish to buy, the lowest being \$18.75

for a \$25 bond. Payment for the bonds will also be made to Mrs. Busselle, and will not be deducted from salary checks.

SMALL PROJECT DEPARTMENT TACKLES RESPONSIBLE JOBS

The smallest department on the Project, yet its 15 men is not too small to tackle one of the biggest jobs in the city which would ordinarily require a 50 man crew.

This is the Project's Electrical Department that looks after the electrical need for this city of 15,000 people.

Responsibilities are great since all departments are directly dependent on this small unit for maintenance of electrical service.

In addition to maintaining a 24 hour vigil in order to give prompt action in the event of fire or storm, the crew patrols the 30 miles network of primary and secondary wiring and some 130 transformers.

At present the power line operation crew is stringing some 4,000 feet of line over the top of Castle Rock.

As if they didn't have enough to do with routine jobs, the electricians repair and maintain some 700 electric motors, 75 electric ranges, 75 electric hot-water heaters, some 300 sewing machines, and a number of hospital

With such a letter, the applicant should go to the office of Internal Security for a personal consultation. Those who fall in this latter group, i.e. all who took out papers after Feb. 1, must take the prescribed steps within the next week if there is any intention of doing so, since these applications will be sent on to the Embassy after that time.
