

SEVEN EVACUEES HIRED BY ICKES AND NEIGHBOR

STATES REASONS FOR MOVE

The International News Service in Washington, D.C. reported Friday that seven Japanese-Americans left the Poston center to work on the farms of Secretary of the Interior Harold Ickes and a neighbor.

In a statement issued at his office, Ickes said he is interested in the Japanese for two reasons.

"First," the statement said, "I believe we should do all we can to ease the burden war has placed upon this group of patriotic

fellow citizens. I do not like the idea of loyal citizens, no matter of what race or color, being kept in relocation centers any longer than needed.

"The second reason is that these citizens have a background of farming in California and we need competent farm help badly. They have been investigated in the usual manner by the Federal bureau of investigation, military intelligence and others. I have excellent reports on them."

AN EDITORIAL:

OUR SCHOOL CREDITS SOUND

Some high school students and their parents seem to be disturbed from hearing rumors that credits given by the school are not accepted by universities and by other high schools. This is nothing more than rumors.

We visited the school and learned that 12 students had already transferred to other high schools and, not a single student had been rejected.

An outside high school in accepting transfer students from the Project not only asks for a transcript of the student's grade but requests a letter of recommendation from the school authorities.

The same procedure is followed when a student enters college. So far no student from the high school here has enrolled in college simply because we've had no graduates. Our first Commencement will be held sometime this summer.

Our school standard meet the entrance requirements of both Stanford University and the University of California.

Any student who can qualify scholastically for either of these two schools can meet the entrance requirement of any college in the United States.

It is the individual ability of the student that counts more than the school from which he graduates.

Even if one is not able to complete his high school course--the draft may take some of the seniors--it is still to his advantage to make the best possible scholastic record for he may wish to return, perhaps after the war, to complete his secondary education and then go on to college.

Thus every thoughtful parent will feel it is his obligation to his children to encourage them to take their studying seriously no matter what the future turn of events may be.

Luncheon In Honor Of Nisei Writer Creates Dissension

The plan of Frank Clay Cross, Relocation official, at whose suggestion a luncheon was given in honor of Mary Oyama, nisei writer, by the Denver's Author League created dissension among members of the league, according to a story in the Colorado Center publication.

Miss Oyama was presented to the league by Cross as a star attraction "who is as American as any of the rest of us."

Objected Mrs. Bessie W. Ruble, one of the founders of the league: "We have three sons in the service. After all our sleepless nights and heartaches and tears, can I do homage to a Japanese even though she may be an American born."

William C. Barret, president of the league, stated that the fact that a woman of the Japanese race was to speak should not commit the league to any course but that of the open mind.

Said Cross: "We must hold no hatred against persons because they happen to be born in another land, or are representatives of another race from our own."

"The honor guest is American and I understand her relatives are fighting for America. This is an opportunity to prove the breadth of our spirit and the sincerity of our claim that justice shall be for all!"

To maintain the same standard of living in February 1943 in other selected cities, the following income would be required: Chicago \$164.41; Cincinnati \$151.75; Cleveland \$160.39; Detroit \$163.52; Indianapolis \$146.77; Milwaukee \$157.23; Kansas City \$142.84; Minneapolis \$156.44; New York \$168.28; St. Louis \$156.19; Denver \$147.72 and Washington, D. C. \$166.52.
