Guided by Henry Omachi, chairman, the Tule Lake Sanitary Corps have done a remarkable job in maintaining health and sanitation in this Project. The Sanitary Corps was organized for the expressed purpose of:

1. Carrying out detailed, systematic inspections of mess halls, latrines, ironing rooms, laundry rooms, recreation halls and other facilities associated with public community health. (The latter include: quarantine and decontamination service, barber and beauty shops, canteens, tsukemono factory, hog and chicken farm, slaughter house, warehouses, butcher shops and public schools.)

2. Making tactful and opportune suggestions wherever necessary or requested to improve sanitary conditions.

3. By virtue of its organization, promoting and maintaining the highest standards of health possible in this community.

The present Sanitary Corps includes: inspectors -- George Hayashida, Jack Hayashida, Tom Ishibashi, Satoshi Nakahira, George Omori, Yosh Yamamoto and Kiyoshi Yama-mura; secretary--Florence Ishibashi; and laboratory. technician -- Mike Kashiwabara.

4. Pamphlets will be published; to bring about a thorough understanding and to arouse interest in the problem of the whole relationship of the Asiatic people to the rest of the American people.

. 5. A national broad -. cast is planned with Congressman Mercantonio as speaker.

6. Advertisements publicizing the bill will appear nationally in newspapers.
