There never was a when young people, with most of their lives ahead of them, should give careful and sound consideration as to what vocation they aim to follow in the future and with this thought in mind should take inventory of their position on the project.

Is the position that you now hold developing your talents and is it a continuation both of your education and employment prior to evacuation?

A great many young people in this Exoject accept work other than that which they expected, as the Placement office has made every effort to urge evacuees to improve their position so they are prepared either immediately on indefinite leave or for the eventual post - war period, to follow their desired vocation.

We do not urge or recommend transforming from one job to another just to make a change; however, if you are not satisfied ~ ~ the present position is not in line with your ambitions, you are urged to confer with me at the Placement office at your lei-

Those evacuees who are not at present working but would like special training in a particular vocation on the project should make their wishes known to the Placement office so that when the opportunity presents itself they may be placed on a training basis.


ment ranging from two (2) to twenty-five (25) workers to work in sugar beets.

There are also all kinds of other row crops such as potatoes, onions, lettuce, all kinds of vegetable seed, peas, corn and fruit in this area.

One typical contract is an offer by John Batt at Wilder, Idaho who wants 20 workers. He will

house laborers in the Wilder F.S.A. camp and transport them to from work. Mr. Batt has 1,320 acres in sugar beets and the most of the balance in lettuce, onions, and potatoes.

The sugar company and the United States Employment Service can furnish jebs for several hundred people in this area.

# AMALGAMATED

Amalgamated acts as a recruiting agent for individual farmers locatin the vicinity of the F.S.A.camps. These farmers provide transportation to and from work. Amalgamated transports the colonists from the Project to the specified camp and back to Newell when the seasonal work is completed without charge.

Placement on individual jobs will be handled by U.S. Employment Service rapresentatives located in each F.S.A. Camp. When no beet work is offered, other types of work are generally available the territory.

The recent "freeze" order by the War Manpower Commission does not affect seasonal workers in any way, as the U.S. Employment Service is established to place workers when and where they are needed. Workers are not obligated to remain on one farm, one county, or state, although when moving from one county or state to another, the approval of the U.S. Employment Service is necessary.

(Continued from page 1) bitterness and fears of the first year are over, and that a mood of acceptance and cooperation is taking place.

He points out the demoralizing influences of camp life. Family ties are broken up because elders are no longer bread winners and young ones do not have the old feeling of dependency.

A wise resettlement program, not rushed and noten masse, is the only solution he said to the evacuee problem which will bring a measure of approbation and will be a boon to the evacuees.
