ARMY SCHOOL CANDIDATES TO BE INTERVIEWED MAY 3

MAY BE LAST CHANCE TO ENROLL AT CAMP SAVAGE

A new program for recruiting candidates for the Army Language School at Camp Savage, Minnesota, has been underway for the past two weeks. This may be the last opportunity to enroll at Camp Savage.

First Lieutenant Thomas P. Davis will arrive on May 3 from Camp Savage to interview prospective candidates and all those who feel that they have the necessary qualifications are urged to get in touch with Mr. M.C. Cooke, chief of Transportation and Supply, as quickly as possible so that

their applications may be considered by Lieutenant Davis.

During the last recruiting program, nearly 100 candidates were interviewed; 36 were finally selected for the school. Some of these young men have returned on furloughs and have praised this branch of the service. Others have written to friends, pleased at the splendid opportunities afforded them in rebuilding their future outside of the project.

Col. Kai Rasmussen has also been lavish in his praise of the work done by the 36 young men who left this project for the Savage School.

M.P.'s Shooting Of Topaz Resident Is Investigated

Investigation is being carried on at the Topaz Relocation Center, Utah by the Spanish Consul, representative of the State Department, the U.S.A., and the community representatives, over the killing of James Hatsuki Wakasa, center resident, by a member of the Military Police, according to the latest reports from that center.

Wakasa was shot and killed on April 11, after he was reported to have ignored the warning of a watchtower sentry who caught him attempting to crawl through the fence surrounding the center.

As a result of a military hearing held at Salt Lake City, the sentry responsible for the killing will be court-martialed at Fort Douglas, it was learned.

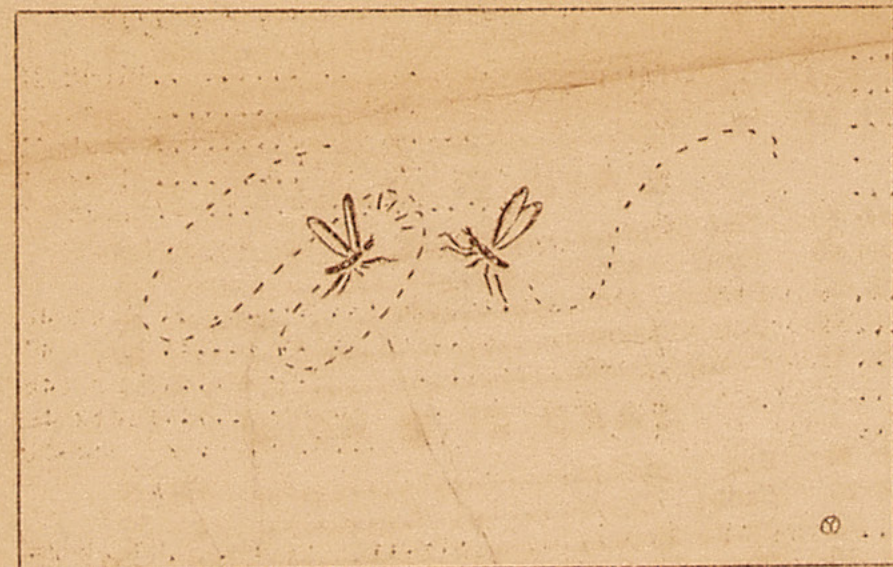
