IN-SERVICE TRAINING PROGRAM IS EXPLAINED

Two Classes At Present For Eligible Workers

For better understanding regarding the commercial in-service training program of the Adult Education Department, the following policies and regulations are called to the attention of all interested;

1. By in-service training is meant training on paid time in specially designated Adult Education classes.

2. Release of any training are requested office worker for to notify the Night training depends on School Director of the recommendation the arrangement by of the worker's written memoranda naming the persons so released.

3. Department heads, subject to the approval of the division chief.

It is not a right, but a privilege to be conferred when, in the opinion of the department head, benefit to both department and worker seems likely.

The privilege may be revoked at any time on recommendation of the department head or of the Adult Education in-service training department.

USE OF NISEI SEAMEN IN GREAT LAKES POSSIBLE

Possibility that all former nisei seamen, now in Relocation Centers, who wish employment on the Great Lakes may have an opportunity to do so was revealed in a report from the Japanese American Committee for Democracy whose headquarter is in New York City.

The Committee has been conferring for several weeks with trade unions having jurisdiction over these seamen and with Government agencies concerned. The result was the announcement by the National Office of the National Maritime Union, CIO.

It was estimated that there are about 200 seamen in the centers who were

All seamen wishing employment on the Great Lakes should get in touch immediately with Jack Lawrenson, vice-president, or E.J. Cunningham, NMU Port Agent, 317 West Fort Street, Detroit, Michigan.

In writing NMU, the seamen are asked to give their former union affiliation so that their union books can be recognized.

The question of the placement of nisei seamen aboard ships on the Atlantic is now being considered by the joint board make up of representatives of the War and Navy Department, War Shipping Administration and the WRA.

There is every hope, the committee reported, that nisei seamen will also be granted this opportunity.
